PRILOFS NEED BOOKS.

Appeal for Reading Matter for People of Two Lonely Islands.

The American Seaman's Friend Society, 76 Wall street, has received an appeal from a Government official on the Pribof Islands, two of which are inhabited, for books for the libraries of each island. The kind of books most desired are books of history, hunting tales and scenes with animal pictures, descriptions of wild animals, bird books with illustrations if possible, nature books, historical novels, fiction and boys' books like "The Swiss Family Robinson." One of the islands has a population of 300 and the other 200. For seven or eight months each year they are shut off from mail facilities.
