

MORE PAY TO CRIMINAL BENCH

BILL GIVES SUPREME COURT SALARIES TO GENERAL SESSIONS.

Objectors Say That More Judges Would Be More to the Point in Clearing Up the Calendar, Which Requires Constant Help From the Supreme Court.

Unless there should develop unexpected opposition to the measure a bill will be passed by the Legislature this week increasing the salaries of the Judges of the Court of General Sessions from \$15,000 to \$17,500. If the bill is signed by the Governor it will mean that a General Sessions Judge will get a salary equal to that of a Supreme Court Justice.

Aaron J. Levy introduced the bill in the Assembly on May 8. About a week later it was introduced in the Senate by James D. McClelland. It is now with the Committee on Rules, and it is believed that it will be reported out this week and passed.

Assemblyman Levy practices in General Sessions and is one of the incorporators of the association recently formed to uplift the tone of the lawyers engaged in the practice of criminal law. Senator McClelland has been practicing in the police courts for years and he also appears in General Sessions.

The bill provides that "there shall be seven Judges of the Court of General Sessions." There are seven General Sessions Judges now. Those who do not favor more salary for the Judges think that unless read carefully the bill carries the implication that the court as it now exists is to be increased. But it is only the salaries that are increased.

The objectors to the bill say that the pressing and immediate need is not more salary for the Judges but more Judges, at least two, in order that the constantly increasing criminal business of the county may be handled more expeditiously. Four years ago the salary of a General Sessions Judge was increased by \$3,000 to \$15,000. For twelve years, from 1895 to 1907, it had been \$12,000. There were only five Judges then. The court was increased in 1907 to seven Judges and the salary jumped to \$15,000. Four of the present Judges—Bosnyak, Foster, O'Sullivan and Crain—were then on the bench. So if the bill becomes a law these four Judges will get another increase of \$2,500 in the course of the terms for which they were elected.

The standing calendar is constantly getting larger. In January, 1910, when by an act of the Legislature the control of the calendar was taken away from the District Attorney and put in the hands of the judges themselves, the cases numbered 710. In the Tombs there were 242 prisoners, 138 of whom had been indicted. Yesterday the standing calendar was 830, and there were 261 prisoners in the Tombs, 206 of them having been indicted. Exactly a year ago, the records show, the standing calendar was 557, with 212 prisoners in the Tombs awaiting trial in General Sessions. Two parts of the Supreme Court, Criminal Branch, have been in session daily in order to aid in disposing of the records in the General Sessions. One cause for the increase in the standing calendar may be due to the fact that only indictments and not cases (there are no records of cases in a single case) are now listed, but this is not the sole cause, it is said.

Under the present system each Judge has two or three months vacation, and the daily sessions of the court average about four hours. The judges say that their work is so arduous that they are entitled to long vacations and that they frequently do work at night of which the public has no knowledge. One Judge of General Sessions said yesterday:

"Our work is most important. As you know, two Supreme Court Justices doing exactly the same work we are doing and with no greater jurisdiction in criminal cases are getting more salary than we get for doing exactly the same work. Evidently certain legislators believe we should receive equal compensation, and I for one would welcome it."

Assemblyman Levy said that he alone was responsible for the introduction of the bill, as he believed that the Judges were entitled to more pay.

"I want to assure you," he said, "that the Judges themselves are not responsible for the bill, nor did they suggest it. In fact I have talked to none of them about it."

"Do you think there should be more Judges?" he was asked.

"Yes, I think there should be more Judges, but I also think that the present Judges should be paid more. I thought there was a bill providing for more Judges, but I haven't been able to find it. On the question of more pay it seems to me that the General Sessions Judges are entitled to as much as the Supreme Court Justices who have been sitting in criminal trials."

"Have you heard of any opposition to your bill?" Mr. Levy was asked.

"None at all," he said. "I thought that the two bar associations and certain of the other judiciary might have some views on the subject, but they haven't expressed any. The other members of the Legislature seem to be for it and I think the bill will be passed the latter part of this week."

END OF CHARTER HEARINGS.

Legislative Committee Expect to Be Busy Three Weeks Over Results.

The hearings before the joint cities committees of the Legislature on the so-called Gaynor charter were completed yesterday at the City Hall. William Butler, representing the Building Trades Employers Association, told the committees that his association objected to giving the Mayor the power of refusing nominations made to him for the board of examiners by the several associations named in the section. Under the present Charter the nominations by the associations interested are final. Mr. Butler also objected to changing the board of examiners' clerk into a "secretary" and thus taking the place out of the classified civil service. Mr. Butler also objected to the provision requiring six votes out of the seven members of the board of examiners to reach a verdict. He suggested that four votes would be more equitable. George A. Just, chairman of the board of examiners, supported the objections and said that the board would file a brief.

Electus D. Litchfield, representing the American Institute of Architects, said that the institute believed that the appointment of a city architect would be advantageous to the city, but that it only in a supervisory capacity, with power of supervision over all architectural work of the city, but not having as one of his duties the drawing of plans or actual supervision of building operations, such as the architect of a building usually exercises.

Senator Cullen, chairman of the Senate Cities Committee, said after the hearing was closed that the joint committees would probably be busy with the charter for the next three weeks.

Ray When Janitor Shot Dies.

Edward Hickey, the janitor of the Donce apartments at Eighth avenue and Forty-ninth street, who shot Bartholomew Pelluso, 15 years old, of 212 West Forty-ninth street, a week ago Friday night because a crowd of youngsters were ringing the bells of the apartment house, will now have to face a charge of homicide. The boy died early yesterday morning in Flower Hospital as a result of the shooting.
