It is now recalled that two months ago a German news agency reported that Germany was to send three warships to Morocco.

Now France is accusing Germany of instigating Spain's policy. The Temps, the Liberte and the Figaro declare that France's first step should be to send a warship to Agadir.

The Temps blames the French Government for allowing Spain to act at Larache and El Ksar without noticing the fact, thereby appearing to be an accomplice and giving the German press an opportunity to allege that France and Spain had come to a secret agreement to share Morocco.

The eternal bugaboo of Germany's increasing naval strength shadows the comments. It is pointed out that Agadir is the most roadstead on the Moroccan coast...

London, July 3.—If the whole German high seas fleet had bombarded Tangier and blown it into the air it would hardly have effected the London press more than has the arrival of the little Panther and her crew of 121 men at Agadir.

KILLED ON HIS RUNAWAY CAR

ANOTHER CAR IN THE WAY WHEN HE COASTED.

Motorman Takes a Chance on a 1,000 Foot Hill on the Westchester Electric Line and Loses His Life—Four Men and Girl, Passengers, Not Much Hurt.

A motorman on a Westchester Electric Company's open car hit his car race 1,000 feet down a hill with the brakes open and crashed into a car that was backing away at the end of the descent.

The report that German troops have landed at Arzila cannot be confirmed. Another report from Madrid is that 600 men were landed at Agadir.

The Times this morning is not inclined to regard the German move against Morocco over seriously and says that it does not create a grave situation if the official assurances are complete and correct.

The Propagator trusts that Germany does not mean to reopen the Moroccan question, but says that if she does Britain will remain loyal to France under any conceivable contingencies.

MADRID, July 3.—The majority of papers approve Germany's move, saying that it is like the move made by Spain against Larache and El Ksar.

MURDERED BY THREE

ONLY THE ARABIC SAILED. Some Hopes for a Settlement of British Steamship Strike Today.

LONDON, July 2.—As a result of several conferences and mass meetings at Hull on Saturday the outlook for the seamen's and dockers' strike being settled is somewhat more hopeful.

The fact that a majority of the dockers are not union members and are not receiving strike pay has helped to induce the strikers to give in.

It is probable that many strikers will resume at Liverpool on Monday pending further negotiations.

PASTOR QUILTS BEFORE TRIAL
