

TO REVISE THE WOOL TARIFF

Taft Warned That Such a Bill is Coming to Him.

WASHINGTON, July 15.—President Taft was advised today by some of the Republican Senate leaders that he could expect to pass on a bill revising the duties on the woolen schedule.

Senator John Sharp Williams, one of the Democratic leaders, who visited the White House, agreed with his Republican colleagues that the La Follette bill would probably pass the Senate.

Some of the Senate leaders do not share the opinion of Senator Smoot. If all the Democratic Senators vote for the bill it will require only five insurgent votes to pass.

Representative Underwood, chairman of the Ways and Means Committee of the House, when seen today said very frankly that the La Follette bill will not be acceptable to the House Democrats.

Representative Underwood pointed out some of the distinctions between the bill that he reported and the House passed and which is now pending in the Senate.

While the prospect of the passage of the wool bill has created some excitement among the Republican leaders in Congress, there appears to be little doubt that if such a measure is sent to the President it will be vetoed.

It is well understood on all hands that the purpose in sending the bill to the President is to make political capital.

AD FOR FIRE SUFFERERS.

WASHINGTON, July 15.—The American Red Cross has gone to the relief of the fire sufferers in Canada with the aid of a preliminary contribution of \$1,000.

At a special meeting of the international relief board of the society today it was voted that this sum should be transferred to be paid out of the reserve emergency fund.

UNCLE JOE A PROGRESSIVE?

Well, Hardly, but Calling Him One Helps Defer Action on Pension Bill.

WASHINGTON, July 15.—Uncle Joe Cannon fished with anger and then grinned to-day when Representative Underwood of Alabama, the Democratic leader, characterized him as a progressive.

Under the rules adopted as a result of the reform movement in the last Congress the first and third Mondays in each month are set aside for the consideration of bills on a special calendar.

Uncle Joe remarked that the House was intelligent enough to pass on the pension bill without a report from committee.

NOT SO, SAYS WICKERSHAM

WASHINGTON, July 15.—Attorney-General Wickersham answered to-day the accusation made by Delegate Wickersham of Alaska that the Attorney-General had permitted the statute of limitations to bar action against representatives of the Morgan-Guggenheim Alaskan syndicate for frauds perpetrated against the United States.

Attorney-General Wickersham's statement in reply was simply that the statute of limitations has not barred action.

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START HUNT FOR WILEY'S FOES

REPRESENTATIVE COX MEANS TO FIND THEM OUT.

Introduction Resolution Calling for All Papers Relating to Protest Against Dr. Wiley's Pure Food and Drug Act Scores Had "Special Interests."

WASHINGTON, July 15.—"Powerful special interests whose welfare in life attaches more to the dollar than to the health, happiness and prosperity of the people" are behind the efforts to have Dr. Harvey W. Wiley, the Government's pure food expert, removed, according to the preamble of a resolution introduced in the House to-day by Representative Cox of Indiana.

Mr. Cox is chairman of the Committee on Expenditures in the Treasury Department. Up to date his committee—one of those which has been busy investigating departmental affairs—has not turned up much in the way of Democratic campaign material and as a result Mr. Cox has suffered extreme disappointment.

Mr. Cox's committee yesterday voted to probe the Wiley matter which has the power to demand without the necessity of waiting for a vote of approval by the House all the documents called for by the Cox resolution.
