

A BUSY DAY FOR ZOOLOGY

MANY ANIMALS, WILD AND TAME, ACTIVE.

An Antelope Mule Meets His End—A Shark Rights a Launch That He Upset—Pinkey, Hindle Kitten, Is Mourned, and a Blacksnake Bites a Negro.

The Bronx zoo received into its midst yesterday a pronouncedly brunette beast possessing a keen eye and greenish tinged mustaches that bristled about a burnt orange goatee. It was, according to Curator Dittmars, a most expensive simian of the sort known as a Diana monkey, whose relatives make home in the western part of Africa.

The newcomer is a he Diana and Mr. Dittmars said that he spent a great deal of time looking for a representative of that family and that he bought it from an animal agent in town for a price which he didn't care to name, but which he said was more than he had paid for a monkey for some time. Curator Dittmars said that presently this Diana monkey would grow a regular beard in addition to its currently flourishing hirsute adornment and that if he lives and lives up to his reputation the beard would be two feet long. He is the only Diana monkey that is known around these parts. The last one brought over here died after a two weeks residence. A big crowd watched the monkey go through the motions incident to making himself feel at home.

END OF A 62-YEAR-OLD MULE. Despite all records of the savants appertaining to longevity in the hybrid species mules, Michael O'Connell, who lives at 2075 Arthur avenue, the Bronx, says that his mule Pat, who had his span rounded out by a policeman's bullet yesterday, had enjoyed sixty-two years of life. Mr. O'Connell is ready to meet all doubters and he has a photograph of him. He came to the Bronx sixty years ago and that Pat, then two years old, was his first stock in trade when he undertook the contracting business in a small way. Can anybody dispute that proof of Pat's fullness of years, Mr. O'Connell asks. They cannot.

Pat walked in every St. Patrick's day parade for twenty-five years up to five years ago, according to his late owner, and he carried himself with that air of late years he had been living in well merited retirement. 'Twas the recent hot weather and a bad bug with a stone that put one of Pat's small teeth that brought about the final debacle.

THE CAT WAS A SNAKE. James Crockett, a negro, was taken to St. Joseph's Hospital at Park Row yesterday afternoon with a bite on his neck which he said had been inflicted by a snake. The negro's story was that he was awakened from a nap in the front room of his home at 80 Butler avenue, Far Rockaway, by something crawling over him. Darned at himself that there was that darned cat again, he swung out his arm to brush the cat off. Then he felt a sharp bite in the neck and yelled.

Crockett and his family stood around while the snake, which they thought was a blacksnake, but of the breed of which they were not sure, scooted out of the door. They said the snake was along toward six feet in length.

An ambulance took Crockett to the hospital. The physicians said last night that the hurt was not serious and the negro would be able to go home to-day.

BRINDLE KITTEN MOURNED. Pinkey is dead. Pinkey was the brindle kitten that hurried from a window on East Twenty-sixth street between Third and Lexington avenues to the sidewalk in front of Mrs. Margaret Herbst of 207 East Twenty-sixth street last Lincoln's Birthday. The kitten sustained a broken leg and other injuries when Mrs. Herbst kicked it up and nursed back its fifteenth life.

Last night Mrs. Herbst went to Lieut. Gregg in the East River second street station and said that Pinkey was dead. Lieut. Gregg showed some concern, as it is a turbulent neighborhood. Later he learned that Pinkey was a cat that had been resuscitated by Mrs. Herbst's dog, called up the Health Department. But Pinkey needed a decent burial, so Mrs. Herbst put in the first of Philip Lombardi, a youth of the name, to insure a respectable interment for the kitten, and the Gas House district mourned.

AN ACTIVE DOG IN EAST NEW YORK. Dora Chulman, 5 years old, of 402 Miller avenue, who likes dogs, tried to pet one when she ran up to her while she was playing with other children near her home in East New York yesterday afternoon. It jumped at her and bit her in the left arm. Two boys kicked it off and the dog ran down the street to Pitkin avenue.

Marnett Mendelson, a man living at 40 Sutter avenue, saved a little girl from being attacked by a dog. He picked her up out of the dog's reach. The animal bit him in the leg. With a crowd of boys in pursuit the dog ran to Pitkin avenue and there he was shot by a young man, Miss Nettie Miller of 407 New Jersey avenue, hitting her in the ankle.

Down the street it attacked another dog and tried to bite a horse. It was shot by a man in pursuit cornered in a lot it made its escape. Policemen were sent from the Liberty avenue station to try and find the dog.

SHARK UPSET A LAUNCH. Otto Schmidt and Fred Gleckman, fishermen of Broad Channel, down near Rockaway, caught a 287 pound shark yesterday morning after a fight which lasted nearly two hours. The shark's length was 7 feet 9 inches.

Silver Hole, an inlet of Jamaica Bay near Broad Channel, is a favorite feeding ground for wild fish and a favorite spot with fishermen. Three of the fishermen reported back at Broad Channel Saturday night that they had seen sharks in the Hole. They thought that this explained why fishing had been poor there for the past ten days or so.

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MONTECLAIR, N. J., July 30.—A campaign among the physicians of Montclair has resulted in reporting a larger number of tuberculosis cases this year and this has given rise here to the impression that the disease is more prevalent. The apparent increase is due to the fact that the cases are being put on record at an earlier stage of the disease than previously. The recording of the cases has been stimulated by the health department.

To Ask Universal Eight Hour Day. It was reported yesterday on behalf of the Industrial Workers of the World, a national organization of labor unions formed in opposition to the American Federation of Labor, that its unions will demand a universal eight hour workday on August 1, 1912. The I. W. O. was formed about five years ago and its unions are largely socialistic. According to Joseph J. Ector, one of its organizers, it has a total membership of 100,000 now.
