

NEW CHAMPIONS IN DOUBLES

TOUCHARD AND LITTLE WIN NATIONAL TITLE

Challengers Defeat Hackett and Alexander the Holders, in Gruelling Four Set Match—Defenders Get One Set in Which Twenty-four Games Are Played.

New York, R. I., Aug. 22.—Gustave F. Touchard and Raymond D. Little, Eastern doubles lawn tennis champions and challengers for the national title, defeated the defending champions, Harold H. Hackett and Frederick B. Alexander, in a gruelling four set match at 7-5, 13-15, 6-4, 4-2 today.

The match was one of the fastest ever seen upon the golf courts of the Casino, and drew the largest crowds that ever assembled for the championship stretch of tennis on hand to honor the victors. The two pairs fought for the supremacy in the doubles for the first time since the national title was taken by Touchard and Little outplayed their opponents at the very game at which they were considered invincible. They drove Alexander and Hackett back from the net, and their strokes and held them through a series of gruelling games in the second set when each was often within a point of winning.

The chief asset of the challengers was in their service for placement. Touchard and Little were the national title holders, and their opponents were the defending champions.
