The Sheriff refused to recognize the authority of bench warrants issued by County Judge Robert Carey and turned the detectives' prisoners loose...

The detectives were unable to serve their third warrant, as they found nobody to arrest. When the raiders and their prisoners reached the county jail in Jersey City...

Half an hour later Sheriff Kelly and Corporation Attorney John J. Fallon of Hoboken walked into the jail. The Sheriff had two prisoners, Nienstedt and his scared porter, and Kelly carried the saloon keeper's hotel register under his arm...

TWO HARVESTS FOR ITALIANS

ONE HERE, ONE IN ARGENTINA. AFTER DIPLOMATIC BREACH.

High Pay in the Southern Hemisphere and Quarantined There Against Shipments Italy Temporarily Put in Two Summers of Farming Work in a Year.

Steamship agents here are discussing the diplomatic breach between Argentina and Italy, due primarily to the cholera, that may result in diverting to Argentina a large number of Italian immigrants who work in this country as farm laborers in the spring, summer and early fall and return to Italy after harvest time...

Some Italian liners brought cases of cholera to Buenos Ayres and the Argentine Government asked for permission to put Argentine physicians aboard all liners bound for Argentina with immigrants. Italy refused to grant this favor, saying that the Italian Royal Commissioners, who are surgeons of the Italian navy and are fixtures on all ships carrying emigrants from Italy, were competent and capable of protecting the interests of everybody. Argentina did not like this refusal and told Italy that she might expect her ships to be rigidly quarantined. Italy, according to steamship men, demanded an apology from Argentina and did not get it, and has not got it yet. Italy, the story goes, has warned her subjects who might be contemplating a trip to Argentina that they would forfeit the protection of the Italian Government by going there until Argentina has apologized and taken off the discriminatory quarantine.


