MAINE NOT SURELY DRY YET

GOV. PLAINED TELLS WHY HE FAVORS ANOTHER VOTE.

Says the Prohibitory Law as at Present Enforced is a Farce and That the State Cannot Progress Till the Matter is Settled. Favors Tenth for Cities.

PORTLAND, Me., Nov. 12.—Gov. Plained in favor of the sale of liquor in Maine cities and says the State cannot expand until "this eternal liquor question is settled."

The principal reason actuating him in calling a special session of the Legislature is to reform the election machinery, to pave the way, he believes, for the people to regulate the sale of intoxicating liquors within the borders of the State.

He believes that the crisis which went on record at the last election by overwhelming large majorities as favoring a change in the Statewide law of prohibition should have another chance to express their right of franchise on the liquor question.

Public sentiment in the cities demands resubmission of the license question, says the Chief Executive. He himself believes the full expression of the people on this score should be made known.

In an interview, Gov. Plained tells the reasons why he will call a special session of the Legislature. In his special message to this session he will lay such emphasis on the need for applying a remedy for the present law system employed at voting places and will suggest that the Legislature enact laws to better safeguard the ballot and insure an honest and far more accurate return at elections.

CADET ISRAEL'S DISMISSAL

It Was for Deficiency in Conduct and Not Because He is a Jew.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—The dismissal of Cadet Joseph Leon Israel of Birmingham, Ala., from the United States Military Academy at West Point was due to the fact that he received more demerits for different minor infractions of the regulations than is allowed.

Israel was appointed to the academy by Representative Underwood last June. For the first two months of a cadet's residence at West Point no demerits are assigned against him when he is reported for minor infractions. He is permitted to make explanations, which are considered by the officers who are charged with the duty of maintaining discipline.

In Israel's case, he received more than the permitted number of demerits, and although some were removed through his explanations a sufficient number were left to cause his dismissal.

Israel was recently in Washington for the purpose of appealing to Major-General Leonard Wood, Chief of Staff, for reconsideration of his case. Whether or not he was successful cannot be learned, as Gen. Wood is now in the West with Secretary of War Stimson.

KICKED DOG OWNER TO DEATH

Man Who Resented an Attack on His Pet Killed in a Fight.

Michael J. O'Boyle, 39 years old, a laborer of 127 South First street, Williamsburg, tied his bull terrier Spot yesterday afternoon out in the back yard of the tenement in which he lived. He forgot about the dog, which began to howl when the rain fell.

O'Boyle heard the dog and on looking out the window saw Rayner kicking Spot. O'Boyle, who was smaller than Rayner, grabbed a carving knife and ran down into the back yard. He stabbed Rayner under the left eye. The latter knocked O'Boyle down and kicked and beat him until hauled off by Policemen Wright and Cummings, who were called in by neighbors.

LEADER IN AQUEDUCT MURDER?

FIFTH OF GANG WHICH KILLED MRS. HALL UNDER ARREST.

Lorenzo Sali, Declared Their Head by One of the Gang.

White Plains, N. Y., Nov. 12.—The fifth member of the rubber gang which Sheriff Hartnett of Westchester county says invaded the Griffen farm house at Croton Lake on Thursday morning and after holding up Mrs. John S. Ray and Miss Anna Griffen murdered Mrs. Harry S. Hall, wife of the superintendent of the Bradley camp of the Croton aqueduct, is now locked up in the White Plains jail.

He was identified by Vincenzo Cona, one of the robbers, as being the ringleader of the gang and will be charged with murder.

The prisoner gave his name as Lorenzo Sali, but Cona says he was known to him as "Tony." He was arrested at 2 o'clock this morning in an Italian boarding house in Smith street, Brooklyn, and was identified immediately by Cona as the principal for whom Sheriff Hartnett and Under-Sheriff Jenkins have been scouring Westchester county day and night ever since the morning of the murder.

Miss Griffen and Mrs. Ray told the Sheriff that Tony, as the prisoner had been called by his companions when the attack was made at the farm house, wore a black coat and cap and had a large black mustache, curled up at the ends, and jet black hair.

TO TAKE DE PEYSTER'S NAME.

One of His Great Grandsons, 6 Years of Age, Will Be Renamed on Jan. 1.

POUGHKEEPSIE, Nov. 12.—That the name of Gen. John Watts De Peyster, statesman, soldier and author, may be perpetuated, John Toler, one of his great-grandsons, will be renamed on January 1.

Under an order signed by Justice Morschauser, John, who is six years old, will become John Watts De Peyster Toler. The child's father, John Watts De Peyster Toler, died a few years ago and his mother petitioned Justice Morschauser for an order changing her son's name.

The little boy is one of the last descendants of the famous De Peysters. Gen. De Peyster, who was born in the home of his mother's father, the Hon. John Watt, Jr., at 3 Broadway, New York, in 1821, was an adjutant general of New York State under Gov. Clarke, he being appointed in 1854. A bronze statue of one of Gen. De Peyster's ancestors, Abraham De Peyster, stands in Bowling Green, New York, opposite the site of the General's birthplace.

Gen. De Peyster, who owned a vast estate in the town of Red Hook, Dutchess county, died about six years ago. He was military adjutant of the State of New York in Europe in 1853.
