

CARNEGIE SAVES PEACE FEAST

RECALL SCANDAL PUT ASIDE AND TALK COMING.

Report That Mr. Carnegie Will Suggest Some Specific Uses for the Income of His \$10,000,000 Peace Fund.

Andrew Carnegie has made it possible for the big peace banquet to be held next Saturday night at the Waldorf-Astoria.

Mr. Carnegie is greatly surprised and somewhat chagrined when he learned that the first of last November, from the Rev. William H. Short of Mount Vernon.

The leading advocate of peace was considerably disturbed. He sent for Charles R. Macauley, the cartoonist and president of the Press Club.

But Mr. Muschenheim declined to be smoothed. He notified the dinner committee that the Hotel Astor was no longer an applicant for the job of feeding a peace folk.

LYNCHED NEAR BALTIMORE

NEGRO IS TAKEN FROM A JAIL AND IS SHOT TO DEATH.

Suburb of Brooklyn Scene of Mob Murder So Quietly Done That Only Two Persons Heard of It Before Victim's Body Was Found by a Passerby.

BALTIMORE, Dec. 25.—Early yesterday morning King Davis, a negro, insulted Frank Schwab, a white man with whom he had been playing pool.

Davis was arrested and taken to the lockup in Brooklyn, a suburb of Baltimore, in which the shooting occurred.

This morning about 3 o'clock seven men broke into the lockup and overpowering Davis, beat him over the head with the flat of a hatchet.

The lynchers had evidently timed their visit so as to reach the lockup when it was unguarded.

Justice Botse called an inquest this morning. David Kinnell and J. W. Carleton who live near the jail, were the only witnesses.

The jury rendered a verdict that Davis died from bullet wounds and that the lynchers were the hands of persons unknown to the jury.
