

GOVERNOR ASKS MUCH IN LONGEST MESSAGE

Suggests Increased State Taxation and Nine Hour Day for Women.

WOULD REPEAL BOXING LAW

Modern State Office Building in Albany and Inspection of Bakeries Demanded.

ALBANY, Jan. 3. Gov. John A. Dix sent to the Legislature to-day his longest annual message, which is the longest list of recommendations the Legislature has received in many years from a Governor.

Some of the recommendations he offers are the making of a vote buying a felony, the repeal of the Frawley boxing law, provision for inspection of bakeries, good roads and a new State office building on the two blocks west of the Capitol.

The Governor first takes up the State's finances for the year ended September 30, 1911. The cash on hand September 30, 1910, was \$22,411,113.74 and the receipts for the year were \$71,315,020.00.

The State debt has been increased during the fiscal year by \$2,000,000, making a total debt of \$79,855,100. Against this debt sinking funds amounting to \$26,807,372.00 have been provided for.

The Governor speaks with satisfaction of the financial record of the State for the year past and of the need of additional revenue in the future, and says:

Progressive responsibility and increasing cost of government necessitate increased revenues, and the devising of new sources of revenue for the State through taxation that make the most equitable and equitably borne by the people of the State.

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insulted to the purpose. The amount spent in rental is sufficient to carry the interest charges on an investment of upward of \$100,000.

The Governor is not satisfied with the law putting the State banks and trust companies under the supervision of the Superintendent of Banks.

At this time, when the protection of the investing public is engaging the attention of the Legislatures of so many States I think it may be well for the Legislature of this State to consider the advisability of extending the jurisdiction of the Superintendent of Banks with respect to the sale of bonds and stocks, and some means should be devised for extending supervision over so-called real estate companies which do a business as a rule in the State.

While the Banking Department is not directly charged with the enforcement of the Penal Law of the State, the Superintendent of Banks and his subordinate have been in frequent consultation with the District Attorneys of various counties in an endeavor to bring to justice those who have wronged or defrauded investors under his supervision.

The Barge Canal, 50 miles long, has progressed at a rate never before equalled. The good results of the cold storage law will be felt for some time yet, but the necessity of a statute has been clearly demonstrated.

TO WIND UP SAVOY TRUST.

Broadway Trust Company Will Take Over and Guarantee Its Deposits.

Plans which have been under way for the liquidation of the Savoy Trust Company of 251 Broadway, the Broadway Trust Company of 751 Broadway to guarantee the deposits of the Savoy Trust, and the latter to go out of business, were consummated last night at a meeting of the directors of both companies held at the Hotel Belmont.
