At school in order that they may later walk into society under their protection. The Earl of Tankerville's son, Lord Oswald, has only been at Eton one term, and the probability is, it is suggested, that the first term, as often happens, is a bit hard on youngsters, especially if they are not hardy, physically and temperamentally. If a young nobleman finds himself a little homesick, a little sad and a little bit upset at being only one small lower boy among many, forced to pay due respect to all his seniors, his title will not serve to temper the wind to the shorn lamb.

At Eton, prince or peer, a boy must first of all pass on the fifth term. A boy with a title is treated at Eton just like any other boy. There are too many of them there for any of them to be looked upon with special distinction. A boy's title is never used there. The college servants address all boys alike as "sir." Boys and masters call the bearers of titles by their plain names. Prince Arthur of Connaught, for instance, was always called "Connaught."

The Duke of Westminster when at Eton was Viscount Belgrave, and was always called "Belgrave." Prince George of Teck is at Eton now. He is called "Teck," and though he is the Queen's brother he is also only a lower boy, and so has to take care of lower boys. Prince George's father for plain Mr. Freeman Thomas.

Altogether one fancies that there may be one or two young noblemen for whom the big English public schools are a little too democratic.

A number of twenty franc gold pieces forged in the reign of Napoleon III. have been found to be worth at least double their face value. This is due to the fact that in the alloy of which these forged coins were made platinum was used.

At that time platinum was cheap. A pound weight of it could be bought for a few shillings. To-day the value of a pound of platinum is nearly £150. It has been shown that the spurious twenty franc pieces contain about six grammes of platinum each, and these six grammes are worth about \$9.

Taking the total cost to candidates we find great differences. The great division of Romford, already mentioned, cost Sir J. Bethell £4,522. A similar large division, that of Walthamstow, another London dormitory, cost the successful candidate £2,703, and he had to fight the division three times in 1910, twice at the regular elections and once again on promotion to Cabinet rank, when he was not allowed, as is often the case in such circumstances, to be returned unopposed in view of the previous elections having been held so recently.

It has already been mentioned that the average cost a vote in England and Wales was 3s. 8d. In Scotland they cost 2 cents less and in Ireland 8 cents less.

Mrs. Billington, a famous old actress of the Victorian era, celebrated her eighty-eighth birthday this week. She is still bright and active and recalls her former associations with Macready, Jefferson, Benjamin Webster, J. L. Toole and many others.

For seventy years she worked on the stage, and nearly all the time in West England. Talking of her early days she says: "What a contrast there is in the salaries on the stage in those days. They were very poor in my time. I was at the Adelphi for sixteen years, and for the first six years I got 30 shillings, 30s. a week. In those days the leading actors, with the exception of Mr. Toole and one or two others, never received more than £12 a week."

Queen Victoria used to be a frequent visitor to the Adelphi. I have reason to remember one of my performances at the Adelphi, because it brought me a great compliment from Charles Dickens. It was playing the part of the unknown lady in "No Thoroughfare," which Dickens wrote for the stage in conjunction with Wilkie Collins.

On Dickens's return from America he made straight for the Adelphi to see the play, and the manager afterward told me that the great author said to him: "I never thought I would have cried or shed a tear at my own work, as I have been made to do by Mrs. Billington's performance."

Mrs. Billington's last engagement on the stage was at the Comedy Theatre here in 1890, when at Sir S. Gilbert's request she took part in Miss Janette's production of "Pygmalion and Galatea."

Mrs. Cohen, a great-aunt of Sir Rufus Isaacs K. C., the Attorney-General of the present Government, died in London on Monday last at the age of 102. She spent her whole life in the city in which she was born, having lived for more than seventy-five years in the house in Broadway, Westminster, where she died. She had fourteen children, twenty-one grandchildren and eighteen great-grandchildren.

Mrs. Cohen married in 1837, three weeks before Queen Victoria's coronation. She attributed her long life to cold water, open windows and plain living. She washed in cold water every morning and slept with her windows open wide. On her death she left a large collection of books, which she had gathered up in her long life. She had a mass of silvery hair. She had then never worn spectacles and could still read her needle and she never needed the service of a doctor until she was 92 years of age.

Mrs. Cohen adopted no special dietary and retired at the same time as the rest of the family. She took a little brandy or whiskey occasionally, and a short time before her 100th birthday she attended a dinner party.

Judge Mulligan, at Downham County Court, has decided that a wasp sting can be regarded as an accident within the meaning of the workmen's compensation act.

A waiter named Potter was employed by a caterer for a wedding feast, which was held in a tent. The day after the wedding the tent was to be used for a dinner to the villagers. Potter, with some other men, was sent to get the tent ready.

It was found that a great number of wasps had been attracted by the lees of the champagne left in the bottles and by the jam left on the plates. One of the waiters, Potter, was struck on the head and he died an hour and a half later from heart failure, caused by the shock. The man was known to suffer from a weak heart. The Judge held that the sting was an accident and that it arose in the course of Potter's employment. The widow was therefore entitled to compensation.

More English railways have abolished second class fares and hereafter their trains will be made up of first class and third class carriages only. The abolition is confined in most cases to transportation on main lines, the railways believing that it would be disadvantageous both to themselves and the travelling public to discontinue the use of second class carriages on suburban routes. Nearly all the season ticket traffic on the suburban lines is second class.

Second class fares will be retained also on trains running to Dover, New Haven and other places where passengers depart by steamer for the Continent of Europe. Most of the passenger traffic is second class and the railways think it would be bad business to make a change. But there is a general inclination on the part of the transportation lines to discontinue second class carriages on account of increasing lack of patronage.

Gen. Sir John French will not be promoted to the rank of Field Marshal when he becomes Chief of the Imperial General Staff and First Military Member of the Army Council. It has been customary to give this highest rank to officers at the head of the General Staff, but King George last year was known some time ago that he believed the list of Field Marshals was getting too heavy and that he was anxious to bring about a gradual reduction in the number.

There are twelve Field Marshals in the British army. Two of them are Emperor
