ARTISTS IN ROME IN OLDER DAYS AND NOW

Franklin Simmons, the American sculptor, has lived in Rome for forty-three years, although, as he said yesterday at the Waldorf, he has made frequent visits back home. Before William H. Seward, then Secretary of State, advised him to go to Europe to work Mr. Simmons was a painter, and in Washington just before the close of the war he had painted many of those celebrated in that contest, including Mr. Seward, Admirals Farragut and Porter and Gen. Grant, Meade, Sheridan and Hooker. It was only after he had become acclimated to Rome that he took mainly to marble and bronze as a means of expression.

TUXEDO ENJOYS COASTING.

When I went to Rome most of the American artists we have since heard about were living there. There were William H. Seward, Hamilton, Grant, William H. Hooker and many others among the sculptors, and I must not forget to mention Miss Hosmer and Miss Scudder. Of painters there were Titon and Buchanan Reid and Stanley Haseltine and others. Although Rome has become the resort of sculptors rather than of painters in recent years, still many of the latter are to be seen and heard in the city. At present the most famous of French painters, Carolus Duran, is living there.
