CHINA SETTLEMENT TO-DAY.

Edicts Renouncing Throne and Establishing Republic Expected at Peking.

PEKING, Feb. 11. There is no reason to doubt the official promise that edicts will be issued to-morrow which will make it possible to begin the settlement of China's troubles in earnest.
