

COPIED FOR CORONER WIFE'S SUICIDE NOTE

Beekman Lorillard Tells of Finding Body Hanging by a Trunk Strap.

MRS. LORILLARD DEPRESSED

Took Her Life in Husband's Brief Absence From Holland House Apartment.

The inquest into the death of Kathleen Leslie Lorillard, wife of Beekman Lorillard of Newport, R. I., who hanged herself in her apartment in the Holland House on the afternoon of March 16 while her husband awaited her in the foyer below, was concluded by Coroner Feinberg yesterday.

Mr. Lorillard told the story of the morning of the suicide. He said that he and his wife had an early luncheon after which, the day being fair, he proposed an automobile ride through the park together. His wife quite cheerfully consented and together they went up to their apartment. Leaving her in her room he started to go down to the clerk's desk to make inquiries as to his 1912 automobile license, but before closing the door leading into the hall called to her: "Kathleen, you had better put on your heavy coat," to which she acquiesced.

At the clerk's desk Mr. Lorillard said he met a friend with whom he chatted for about fifteen minutes. Then he called up his apartment to inquire if his wife was ready for the drive. The telephone boy reported that the telephone did not answer. Mr. Lorillard took the elevator up. Entering his apartment he called to his wife and getting no answer went into her bedroom and saw her body hanging in the bathroom near the door.

He attempted to break the canvas trunk strap by which she hung. Near by lay one of his safety razors and with it he hacked the strap, severing it in a second or so. His wife's body fell in his arms and then he laid it on the floor. He did not know what to do, but he remembers that he moved his wife's arms up and down and then leaned over her and breathed his own deep breaths into her mouth. Seeing that she was still unconscious and not knowing whether she was dead or not he left her and telephoned to the desk that "something terrible" had happened in his apartment. The assistant manager of the hotel came up and Dr. A. A. Moore of 43 East Thirty-third street was called.

Mr. Lorillard said that he then called up the Hotel Belmont in an endeavor to find his mother, Mrs. Louis Lorillard, but she was out; then he called the Warrington apartments at 161 Madison avenue, where lived his aunt, Miss Martha C. Beekman, whom he told of his wife's suicide. Miss Beekman came while Dr. Moore was yet at work trying to revive Mrs. Lorillard. Ten minutes later the doctor told the husband that his wife was dead.

Upon being questioned by the Coroner as to his wife's health he said that since their marriage she had but once been under the care of a physician—when her throat was operated upon last summer. He said, however, that since his arrival from Europe three days prior to her death she had seemed depressed, nervous and had been unable to get but an hour or so of sleep each night.

The young woman's mother, Mrs. Anna Esther Doyle, dressed in heavy mourning, was first questioned, but had little to tell. She spoke only of the visit of her daughter to her home in Asheville in November of 1911. Her daughter had driven a very serious horse that on a certain morning became frightened at a piece of paper, ran away, upset the buggy and threw Mrs. Lorillard upon the hard roadway. Mrs. Lorillard fell on her head and was unconscious for several moments. She had seemed at times despondent before the fall.

For the benefit of Mrs. Doyle, who had not been present at the former inquest, Coroner Feinberg read to her the testimony taken at the first session, including that of Dr. Moore, the assistant manager of the hotel, the maid who had found Mrs. Lorillard's note under the bathtub, and the Coroner's physician, Dr. Weston.

The Coroner asked William H. Van Benschoten of the law firm of Bowers & Sands, who appeared for Mr. Lorillard, for the note that Mrs. Lorillard had left. It was scribbled in pencil upon the back of a grocer's billhead. Much crumpled and torn in three or four places, Mrs. Doyle read the note and then told the Coroner that it was in the handwriting of her daughter. The Coroner then handed the note to Mr. Lorillard and asked him the same question. It was, said Mr. Lorillard.

"Now Mr. Lorillard," said the Coroner, handing a blank piece of paper to the young man, "kindly write what I dictate to you in your natural manner. I shall dictate what is written in your wife's note." Then the Coroner slowly dictated as follows: "I do this by my own free hand because I am tired of this world. No one is to blame in the least. Kathleen."

Mr. Lorillard handed back to the Coroner the piece of paper and watched him closely while he compared the two pieces of writing. "Very good, sir," said the Coroner, placing both pieces of paper upon his desk.

"Now, Miss Stenographer," continued Coroner Feinberg, "take down what I say. In view of the testimony of the witnesses and in view of the findings of the physician it is my firm belief that the deceased died of asphyxiation by strangulation—that she committed suicide."

SOLDIERS AS FIRE FIGHTERS.

Helped Put Out a Blaze That Threatened to Destroy the City of Salem, N. J.

SALEM, N. J., April 6.—A fire which threatened to destroy a considerable part of the town was put out early this morning partly through the efforts of soldiers from the Fort Mott army post, four miles from here.

The fire started in an abandoned knitting mill and spread to the Grand Opera House, close by. In a short while that building was in ruins. From there the flames swept on to the home of Thomas T. Jaquette, entirely destroying that and the building. The Ramsey building, the Friends' schoolhouse and another dwelling caught fire and were badly damaged. The total loss is estimated at \$75,000.


