

POLICE HONOR ROLL PICKED BY COL. ASTOR

Man Who Met Death Bravely on Titanic Had Passed On Names for Hero Tablet.

2 OTHERS ON COMMITTEE

List of Officers Killed in the Performance of Duty and Their Deeds.

The names of policemen who have died in the performance of their duty, selected by a committee composed of the late Col. John Jacoby Astor, R. A. C. Smith, and Philip Rhineland, which are to be placed on the bronze and marble tablets on either side of the entrance to Police Headquarters, were given out yesterday.

The names have been selected with great care. There were many cases from which to select the roll of honor, and it was only after some deliberation that the names were finally chosen.

Patrolman James Cahill; died September 29, 1854. Was shot through the heart and died instantly, while endeavoring to apprehend two burglars, at Tenth street and Avenue B.

Patrolman Eugene Anderson; died July 20, 1857. Shot and killed by Michael Canini, while trying to prevent him from shooting a citizen who had discovered him in the attempt to burglarize a shoe store at Grand and Center streets.

Patrolman Horatio Sanker; died November 22, 1857. This patrolman was found beaten to death with a club, following a fight in a restaurant on Bleeker street, near Canal.

Patrolman David H. Martin; died August 6, 1861. Was stabbed in the neck by a burglar named William Curtis, at Washington and Prospect streets, Brooklyn. He was brought to the station house, where he died fifteen minutes later.

Patrolman George W. Duryea; died May 15, 1864. Was shot through the temple while in the act of arresting a pickpocket.

Patrolman John O'Brien; died August 25, 1864. Was shot by John Reilly, in a saloon, Forty-first street and Ninth avenue, Reilly escaped.

Patrolman Thomas Walker; died August 16, 1865. While assigned to special duty in plain clothes, accompanying two other officers, he came upon a gang who had assaulted a woman in a house on Seventeenth street. Walker was the first one to enter the house and was shot by one of the gang.

Patrolman Harry Corbett; died July 12, 1868. He was drowned while attempting to rescue Jane Bell, 14 years old of 384 Eighth avenue, who was attending an excursion of the A. P. A. Society. The accident occurred off 152d street.

Patrolman Phillip Lambert; died March 14, 1872. Lost his life trying to quell a riot between laborers at Fifty-ninth street and Second avenue. He was struck on the head by a stone in the hands of one of the laborers, George Lavery, fracturing his skull. Notwithstanding his injuries, he dragged his assistant, Lavery, to the station house, a distance of over four hundred feet, from the location of the riot. He subsequently died in St. Luke's hospital, from his injuries. Lavery was sentenced to twelve years in Sing Sing prison.

Patrolman John Donahue; died December 6, 1872. Was assaulted while making an arrest and was found on North First street and Union avenue, Brooklyn, with his skull fractured.

Sergeant James McElvay; died July 24, 1875. Was stabbed in the abdomen by one Kunkicker, who had stolen a watch and was being pursued when intercepted by McElvay.

Patrolman Asa H. Furness; died December 29, 1878. Shot by an insane man who was in a hotel threatening to shoot everybody in sight. When Furness arrived he sprang upon him, endeavoring to hold his arms. The insane man freed his pistol hand and fired two shots, which killed the officer.

Patrolman Francis Mallon; died May 4, 1882. Was shot and killed by Michael Sullivan of 123 Chestnut street, who Sullivan was hiding in a doorway and Mallon ordered him to move on. He did so, but later on Mallon ran across him lurking around doorways and as he approached him, Sullivan shot him. Mallon walked a few feet and fell face down in the gutter. Sullivan leaned over him and fired two more shots into his body.

July 29, 1906. Lost his life while endeavoring to rescue from drowning 133-year-old Manolino, 13 years old, of 133 West Houston street, who had fallen into Crampton Creek. The policeman plunged into the creek and both he and the boy were drowned.

Patrolman George M. Sechler; died April 14, 1907. Patrolman Alfred A. Selbeck; died April 16, 1907. The two policemen were shot and killed by Salvatore Governale, who ran from Washington Square Park, where he had shot an Italian, through Thompson street and into the hallway of 232. The two officers, who were pursuing him, followed him into the hallway, and when within about four feet of the prisoner they were shot by him.

Patrolman Eugene S. Sheehan; died October 22, 1907. Shot and killed by a one armed man he had order to move on from in front of 22 Chatham Square. The bullet hit Policeman Sheehan in the right eye and killed him instantly.

Patrolman Edward J. Kavanagh; died November 14, 1907. Shot and killed by William Brown, colored, 325 Gold street, who was arrested by Policeman Kavanagh on Gold street, between Willoughby street and Myrtle avenue, Brooklyn, charged with snatching a bag from Mrs. Charles E. Johns, of 194 Tuffield street, Brooklyn. The prisoner while being placed under arrest struggled with the officer. During the struggle he drew from his pocket a revolver and shot Policeman Kavanagh in the left breast.

Patrolman Robert J. Fitzgerald; died January 11, 1908. Lost his life in attempting to prevent Edward Walker, 21 years old, of 537 Wabash avenue, Chicago, Ill., from committing suicide by jumping from the Brooklyn Bridge.

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Patrolman John Loughman; died January 27, 1908. Lost his life in assisting Patrolman John J. Allen, who had placed under arrest Peter Conroy of 108 East 104th street. The prisoner while being placed on a southbound Third avenue surface car at 115th street and Third avenue. Conroy was jostling passengers. Allen attempted to place Conroy under arrest, and during the struggle the prisoner reached a revolver from Allen. Loughman, who was a passenger in the car, went to the assistance of Allen. Conroy had hold of Allen's pistol hand and succeeded in pulling the trigger, sending a bullet through the roof of the car. Conroy then reached the pistol from Allen and shot Loughman.

Lieut. Joseph Petrosino; died March 12, 1909. Was assassinated in Palermo, Italy. Petrosino was sent to Italy in the hope that he could get some clue to the operation of Black Hand bands who were active in New York. His whereabouts were kept as secret as possible, but apparently he was followed by those who feared him. One night he was found shot. Several arrests were made but the crime was never brought home to any one.

Patrolman James F. Mangano; died October 26, 1909. Lost his life at a fire at 1718 Eighth avenue, Brooklyn, while rescuing Dorothy Schmeizel, aged 9, who was overcome by smoke. Patrolman Mangano was overcome by smoke in the hallway of the second floor and fell over the banister, a distance of about twelve feet.

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Patrolman James Brennan; died October 28, 1888. Was killed by "Handsome Harry" Carlton, at Thirty-third street and Third avenue. Brennan lost his life while endeavoring to assist one Towler, who was held up by Carlton and two confederates.

Patrolman John J. Sherman; died September 1, 1891. Was killed by an armed colored servant, one Francis Noah, for disorderly conduct. Noah stabbed Sherman in the heart, causing instant death.
