MADERO AND OROZCO ARMIES IN BATTLE? State Department Believes Decisive Engagement Has Begun.

WASHINGTON, April 28.—Eight thousand Mexican regulars and 8,000 rebels are marching toward each other prepared to fight what may prove to be a decisive battle.

The Federal advance was begun yesterday, it is reported, by General Huerta, who is marching toward Escalón, on the main railroad in the southeastern corner of Chihuahua State.

Several weeks ago it was reported that the rebels had driven the Federals back as far as Torreon, Durango, where the first really important engagement was expected to take place.

The State Department's advice is that these reports are a "gross exaggeration."

GET ROSSI IN PARIS FOR GIRL'S DEATH HERE

Miss Elsa Van Dessauer Taken From His Rooms With Fractured Skull in 1907.

BANKER FLED TO EUROPE

Before She Died in Hospital the Girl Said Rossi Beat Her With a Vase.

Special Cable Dispatch to THE SUN. PARIS, April 28.—Charles Rossi, alias Sylvio Marchesini, an accountant, aged 38, was arrested here to-day.

Carlo Rossi, a banker and custom house broker at 60 Baxter street, dropped out of sight on July 4, 1907. On that day there had been a party in his apartments at 510 Amsterdam avenue which ended in the removal of Elsa van Dessauer to the J. Hood Wright Hospital.

The circumstances of the alleged assault were reported by Dr. Arthur Beatty, who attended Elsa, but he remained silent for several days at the request of the young woman, it being supposed then that Elsa would recover.

When the young woman reached the hospital she was suffering from a fractured skull, a broken nose, ruptured eardrums and bruises.

At the subsequent hearings before the coroner Elsa's story was confirmed by Mathilde, Albert Rossi, brother of Carlo, who was a member of the Fourth of July party and a witness at the coroner's hearing.

Despite all efforts to locate Carlo he got away and at the time it was the general opinion that he had sailed for Europe.

FIVE TOUGHS TO WORKHOUSE


