

WHO GAVE THAT MILLION LA FOLLETTE ASKS T. R.

Senator, Entering Ohio Fight, Says It Comes From Gary, Perkins and Hanna.

Taft Organization Bad

President Not a Prime Favorite Among the Buckeye Farmers.

Toledo, Ohio, May 17.—President Taft and United States Senator Robert M. La Follette invited Toledo tonight in a common cause.

While the President was pointing out Roosevelt's inconsistencies before a big audience in the Auditorium Senator La Follette was laying the Colonel before another big crowd a few miles out of the city.

Senator La Follette's attack upon Roosevelt tonight was the beginning of a two days campaign by him in the Ninth Congressional district.

Senator La Follette promises to go after Roosevelt a second time. He will, it is declared, charge in his speech tomorrow night that three men closely identified with Wall Street interests, George W. Perkins, Judge E. H. Gary of the Steel Trust and Dan R. Hanna of Cleveland have raised \$200,000 for the Roosevelt campaign fund and are now spending it freely in an effort to corral delegates for the Colonel.

"I will call upon Col. Roosevelt," said the Senator tonight, "to publish a complete list of contributors to his campaign fund before I leave Ohio. I shall make affidavit to the accounts and the donors to my campaign fund. I ask that Col. Roosevelt be equally frank with the people in this respect."

Senator La Follette has delegates up for election in only four of the Ohio districts. These are the Ninth, Twelfth, Twentieth and Twenty-first, which include the cities of Toledo, Columbus and Cleveland.

"In Ohio," said Senator La Follette today, "there is a splendid opportunity for the voters to advance the progressive cause. If Roosevelt and Taft go into the Chicago convention with anything like equal strength we can with the delegates already pledged to us hold the balance of power in forming a genuinely progressive platform and in choosing a genuinely progressive candidate."

All four districts in which La Follette delegates are running are doubtful as regards to President Taft's chances. The indications now are that La Follette will pole a very tight vote, but even a few hundred votes drawn from the Roosevelt strength in any of these districts may be sufficient to turn the tide in Mr. Taft's favor.

These Republican candidates for the Presidential nomination will speak in Newark the latter part of next week. Col. Roosevelt will address meetings in the Roosevelt Armory and Military Park near Thursday night. United States Senator La Follette will talk at the new auditorium in Orange street on Friday night and President Taft will arrive on Saturday.

The itinerary of President Taft's four days tour in the State has been lengthened instead of making only one speech in Hudson county on Friday night he will tour the county. He will visit Layton, Kearny, Harrison, West Hoboken, New Hawken and Jersey City.

On Monday, May 27, the President will give the following speeches in the order named: Bayonne, Elizabeth, Garret, Perth Amboy, Marwan, Red Bank, Asbury Park, Long Branch, Lakewood, Vineland, Bridgeton, Mays Landing, Pleasantville and Atlantic City.

Judge Duell's Say. Can't Read Roosevelt Out of Party—Too Late for Compromise.

Judge Charles H. Duell, chairman of the New York Roosevelt committee, put out a statement last night, part of which read:

Col. Roosevelt will have a majority of uncommitted delegates in the convention. My previous prediction that he will receive the support of delegates on the first ballot still holds good.

Gov. Wilson Embarrassed. Too Many Friends Running for Delegate in One District.

BRUNSWICK, N. J., May 17.—Gov. Wilson is in a predicament of his political advisers today that there is no prospect in the State of his being elected to the Presidential nomination.

The conferees considered the situation in the Fifth district, where W. J. R. Lynde, James S. Paris and Edwin T. Russell have been nominated as Wilson delegates.

HILLES TELLS HOW T. R. ENDED HARVESTER SUIT

President's Secretary Reveals Partisan Reasons for Dropping Case.

ACT OFFENDED BONAPARTE

Statement Includes One Made by Investigator Who Was Turned Down.

WASHINGTON, May 17.—The story of how President Roosevelt suppressed the case against the Harvester trust for purely partisan purposes is told in a statement made public today by Charles D. Hilles, secretary to President Taft.

Mr. Hilles included in his statement one made by United States Attorney Townsend, who conducted an inquiry into the affairs of the Harvester trust under the direction of Charles J. Bonaparte. Mr. Roosevelt's Attorney-General Mr. Townsend recommended that proceedings be instituted against the Harvester combine, but his recommendation was ignored.

The Hilles statement demonstrates that at one stage of the negotiations in connection with the Harvester trust Attorney-General Bonaparte showed disgust over the evident determination of President Roosevelt to remove with George W. Perkins and his associates.

I have come to Washington to get United States Attorney Townsend's statement in reference to the Harvester trust. It shows conclusively that President Roosevelt compelled his Attorney-General to discontinue the prosecution of the Harvester trust.

Mr. Townsend began his inquiry in the spring of 1906. On February 21, 1907, Mr. Bonaparte transmitted Townsend's report to United States District Attorney Sims at Chicago, instructing him to take up the matter with a view to its being referred to criminal prosecution against individuals and corporations implicated.

Mr. Townsend considered this statement of the Harvester trust not only insufficiently supported by evidence but also as a violation of all the essential facts showing a violation of the anti-trust law.

Shortly afterward Mr. Perkins the organizer of the Harvester trust called upon Mr. Bonaparte in company with Herbert Knox Smith and James H. McCombs.

Attorney-General Bonaparte gave me this explanation for the purpose of assuring me that he had not intentionally broken his word with me in the matter of authorizing me to institute a suit against the Harvester trust.

WON'T FLOP, SAYS BARNES. No Sign Brooklyn Taft Delegates Have Lost Their "Self-Respect."

Chairman Barnes of the Republican State committee, commenting yesterday upon the rumors that Timothy L. Woodruff might flop to Roosevelt, made this statement:

"One delegate in Brooklyn was elected a follower of Mr. Roosevelt. The other fifteen were elected upon the understanding that they were in favor of the renomination of President Taft."
