NO FIGHT FOR SEATS. R. B. Howell of Nebraska, Borden Whitling of New York, Thomas K. Neidinger of Missouri, who have been elected national committeemen by primary or state convention and who it was expected were to make a fight to-day to take their seats, claiming that they were elected to act immediately, did not present themselves and therefore there was no fight. Mr. Howell gave out the following statement as to why he had decided not to make a fight for his seat in the committee: "Mr. Roosevelt will retain his seat in the national committee for the present without contest. I have been requested by Senator Dixon to defer the presentation of my credentials.

While I am legally entitled without question to perform the functions of national committeeman for Nebraska, I shall attempt to assume the duties of that office only when the interests of Col. Roosevelt's campaign so demand. I have been thoroughly re-examined by the Roosevelt management in this matter from the beginning and in assuming this attitude I believe that I have been and am now fully performing the duty imposed upon me by the progressive Republicans of Nebraska when they so decisively recalled my opponent Mr. Roosevelt.

ROLL CALLS NO EASIER. The next step in the proceedings of the national committee was the introduction of a resolution by Senator Borah which amended the rules of the 1908 convention markedly. It provided that roll call in the national committee should be brought about only by the consent of twenty members. Senator Borah's amendment to-day provided that a roll call of the committee could be had on the demand of eight members.

A roll call in the national committee is recently of tremendous importance. In 1904 and 1908 no roll was adopted. It is considered for the reason that Roosevelt and McKinley respectively in those years had no candidates opposed to them for the nomination.

On motion of Leads P. Shackelford a resolution providing for the extension of time in the committee in which to hear the contests. A big Roosevelt mass meeting will be held later in the week, it is said, and caucuses of every State delegation under Roosevelt instructions will be held. It is planned to perfect an organization which will work for a stampede of the Taft men.

Ormsby McHarg, said there was no doubt of the success of the Roosevelt fight. "We have 512 votes nailed down," said he, "not counting the contested delegates in Alabama, or half of those of those we will get in New York."

The New York situation is interesting both sides. Judge Charles H. Duell, Roosevelt's New York agent, has advised Senator Dixon and said that twenty votes for Roosevelt on the first ballot was a liberal estimate of New York's contribution.

Arthur Vesty, national committeeman from Ohio, characterizes Roosevelt's assertion that the six delegates at large from that State were captured in "true blue" Republicanism as "a mere bluff." It has been stated by these dispatches on the authority of Roosevelt men that the ex-President, with all the contests decided for him, would be 31 votes short of the number required to nominate him. There is no reason to-night for changing that statement.

President Taft is certain to control the Republican national convention by a majority. The first ballot is completed and the nomination of the President is demonstrated there is no way of securing the nomination of any other man. The convention in excess of his assured majority.

In addition the President has carried in the contest for delegates just closed in Alabama 35 votes, and South Carolina fourteen for Mr. Roosevelt.

T. R. HURRIES FLINN TO CHICAGO TO AID DIXON

Not to Supplant Manager, but to Be the Senator's Assistant. MAY FOLLOW NEXT WEEK. Doing Pretty Well Now With a Direct Wire to the Windy City.

OSTER BAY, I. J., June 6. In close touch with Chicago by means of a wire to Sagamore Hill Theodore Roosevelt is directing the pro-revolution fight through his lieutenants on the ground. His most significant move to-day was to despatch Senator William Flinn of Pennsylvania to the scene of the struggle after a long conference, in which E. A. Van Valkenburgh, Alexander P. Moore and Richard Quay, son of the late Senator Quay, participated. The session did not terminate until late to-night, and Senator Flinn got away barely in time to catch the last train from New York to the convention city.

That Senator Flinn is hastening to the field of action fresh from such a conference to look after the interests of his principal is considered indicative of the character of the fight which is to take place. If strong arm tactics are to be resorted to champions will not be lacking on the Roosevelt side. Said the Colonel to-night with evident satisfaction: "Senator Flinn is starting at once at my request for Chicago." Questioned as to the Senator's mission he replied: "I want him to be there in my interests. Senator Dixon will be in charge, but Flinn is to assist Dixon."

Whether counting upon the competency of his managers or upon the fairness of the Taft committee, he restrained, as he pointed out yesterday, they will be watchful constituents, the Colonel made it plain that he did not feel that his presence would be desirable in the early stages of the contest.

Brooker of Connecticut, Col. Harry S. New of Indiana, Ernest F. Har of Iowa, W. Murray Crane of Massachusetts, and George W. Richardson and Frank B. Kellogg of Minnesota.

Col. New for three conventions has been chairman of the sub-committee of arrangements. His father, John C. New, President Harrison's Consul-General to London, was the first chairman on the sub-committee of arrangements. He is a husband to-night. "Harry is to retire. If he doesn't retire I have told him to get a new wife."

SAYS WILSON WILL WIN. COMMITTEEMAN HUDSPETH LOOKS FOR IT ON SECOND OR THIRD BALLOT.

Former Judge Robert S. Hudspeth of Jersey City, Democratic national committeeman from New Jersey, said yesterday: "Speaker Champ Clark is apparently in the lead for the Democratic Presidential nomination at present, but he has not the two-thirds vote necessary to insure his nomination and he will never get it. We are receiving assurances from various sources that the majority of large number of votes will go to Gov. Wilson after the first ballot, when the complimentary votes will be distributed. I look for Gov. Wilson's nomination on the second or third ballot, and it may even take five ballots to nominate him, but there is no doubt in my mind as to the final outcome."

SETBACK FOR GOV. WILSON. Bryan's Friends Fail to Get a Second Choice Instruction. RALEIGH, N. C., June 6.—The State Democratic convention unanimously nominated Locke Craig for Governor this afternoon. It is the second uncontested nomination ever given in North Carolina. Craig's speech of acceptance was an arrangement of both Taft and Roosevelt, though he declared Taft the rightful Republican nominee.

Woodrow Wilson supporters were disappointed to-day when the Sixth Congressional convention defeated the Wilson instruction and sent four unopposed delegates to Baltimore. The Charlotte Observer editorially declared for Wilson. That Wilsoner might mean the State convention is certain, but they may not secure instruction.

MINNESOTA FOR WILSON. Bryan's Friends Fail to Get a Second Choice Instruction. DULUTH, Minn., June 6.—Bryan's friends in Minnesota made an effort to stampede the convention to-day to put in second choice instructions for him. They were long on eloquence, but the delegates were not so long on action. The delegates agreed that his nomination is impossible without the support of only a few "No." This was the only fight that developed in the convention.

COLORADO TO CONTEST. Progressives Send Roosevelt Delegation to Chicago. DENVER, Col., June 6.—Three hundred progressive Republicans in convention here to-day elected a protesting delegation to the national convention at Chicago.

The meeting memorialized the national convention to seat the delegation and declared its preference for Theodore Roosevelt for President, but did not instruct the delegates to vote for him. About ten counties of the State were represented.

OPPOSE CENTRAL PARK BOAT HOUSE PLAN. LOVERS OF NATURE SEE MENACE TO BEAUTIES IN PROJECT FOR BUILDING.

Some of those who have the interests of Central Park very much at heart think that they have unearthed a new menace to its landscape beauties in a plan which Commissioner Stover has pending before the Board of Estimate for a combination boathouse and skate house to cost \$100,000 to be erected on the site of the present small boathouse on the east bay of the lake, close to the East Drive.

Commissioner Stover has included a request for such a building in a statement submitted to the Board of Estimate last January as to requirements for the year beginning July 1. Thus far no action has been taken on this particular item, but it is expected that it will be taken up in a couple of weeks. At that time a strong protest is likely to be made against the plan as proposed by Mr. Stover.

One of the arguments to be used against the project will be that no less an authority than Frederick Law Olmsted, who laid out the park, reported in strong terms against a similar plan when it was suggested back in 1873. Mr. Olmsted was then landscape architect of the park and thought that the natural beauties should be maintained.

The present small boathouse was the result of Mr. Olmsted's report and was erected under his supervision. It has been in use for over twenty-five years and a new building of some kind is needed. Mr. Stover's plan is to combine the facilities of the boathouse with those now provided for skaters in the portable building erected in the winter on the beach at the south end of the large lake. In addition Mr. Stover would have the building large enough to include a restaurant.

In giving the reasons for such a building in his application to the Board of Estimate the Park Commissioner says that the temporary skatehouse and toilet building erected on the south shore each winter for skaters present a very unsightly appearance and the \$100,000 building he proposes would be for use in all seasons.

The lake is frequented by large crowds both summer and winter, and the present facilities are wholly inadequate to meet the necessities of the public, and a substantial return for the cost of the building should result from the letting of boat, skate and refreshment privileges.

It was said at Mr. Stover's office yesterday that only tentative plans for the combination boathouse and skatehouse had been drawn as yet. These provided, it was said, for a long low structure, a good deal larger than the present building, but not occupying any more of the ground because a large part would extend over the lake with a number of piers running out. The middle portion of Mr. Stover's proposed structure would have a beautiful red tiled mansard roof and the two wings would have something on top of them resembling a pagoda, where spectators might take refreshments.

Speaking of Mr. Stover's plan in its general aspects, W. B. Van Ingen, an artist, of 58 West Fifty-seventh street, who is among those who intend to protest against it, said yesterday that the same objection could be made as with many other plans proposed by Mr. Stover, which have contemplated filling the park with buildings.
