WILL BUILD ROAD FOR HOISTER.

Workmen to Lay Tracks in Street to Move Machine.

A one hundred ton hoisting machine was brought from the Brooklyn navy yard to Pier A at the Battery yesterday in a Merritt-Chapman barge. To move the machine a railroad will be built in a city street and the big hoister will be hauled on rails to Broadway and Morris street, where it will be used for caisson building.

The machine, which had been taken one-fourth of the distance last night, is on a steel car very much like a flat freight car, but with a single set of wheels on one side of the car to the end of the tracks, after which workmen will take up the tracks that have been left behind and lay them again in front of the car.

It will probably take a day before the machine reaches Morris street. The course will be from the pier along Battery place to Greenwich street, along Greenwich to Church street, and from Church Street to Morris street.
