'ETHICS' FREED MRS. GRACE?

Prosecutor Says His Own Testimony Would Have Convicted Her.

ATLANTA, Ga., Aug. 8.—A public statement made today by Solicitor-General Hugh M. Dorsey, who prosecuted Mrs. Daisy Ople Grace, acquitted five days ago of the charge of having shot her husband, says that he could have convicted Mrs. Grace if he had testified what he himself knew of the shooting.

Mr. Dorsey said that he heard the shot fired in the Grace home between 5 and 6 o'clock in the morning, which contradicted Mrs. Grace's statement that the shot had not been fired until after 11. Legal ethics, Mr. Dorsey said, kept him from giving testimony at the trial.

"I thought no more of the shot I had heard" said Mr. Dorsey, "until two days after the shooting, when the authorities gave me the two airtight letters they had found in the Grace residence, Mr. Dorsey said, which were addressed to the Grace home, and my wife and I both heard the shots. We could easily have disproved the contention of the defense that Grace was not shot until after 11 o'clock, when she was away from home."

Mr. Dorsey said that eminent judges whom he consulted and told him that it would have been unethical for him, the prosecutor, to testify against Mrs. Grace.

He addressed all his efforts to that end. That he succeeded is one of his chief merits in the eyes of his enlightened countrymen. But after all M. Izvolksky is but the executor of the will of the Czar, and it was currently feared in Japanese Government circles that the Czar nursed a desire for revenge, which would take effect as soon as Russia deemed herself really ready. And this impression was confirmed by the debates in the Council of the Empire on the Amoor railway bill. In the spring of 1909 his Majesty himself had signified his wish that certain measures should be adopted without delay in the Far East. Taken together, these projects constituted a rounded scheme of policy the object of which was unmistakable: the double tracking of the Trans-Siberian line, the construction of another Russian route to the Far East.
