

EUROPEAN BANKERS HOPE TAFT WILL WIN

Col. Colt Lists \$10,000,000 of U. S. Rubber Securities on Paris Bourse.

Col. Samuel Pomeroy Colt, president of the United States Rubber Company, returned from Europe yesterday on the White Star liner Olympic.

"I made application to list \$10,000,000 of our first preferred stock on the parquet of the Paris Bourse," he said.

Speaking of the coming election Col. Colt said: "I think that the reelection of Mr. Taft will produce a greater confidence in the country and in Europe as well."

Battalion Chief Richard J. Marshall of the second district was defendant at Fire Headquarters yesterday on charges of drunkenness and conduct unbecoming an officer and gentleman made by Dr. Henry Schiff of 160 Madison street.

The charges came of a slight fire in the physician's home at 4:30 o'clock on the morning of June 30. The physician wrote to Mayor Gaynor that the battalion chief acted like a "drunken maniac" and assaulted him in his home.

Marshall said that he had been in the Fire Department for nineteen years. "Never in my life did I smoke, chew or drink," he said to Deputy Commissioner Olvany. "So strong has that habit been in me that I have refused to obey my doctor's orders to use whiskey when sick."

LEVY ELECTION LAW CLAUSES HELD VOID

Supreme Court Justice Tompkins' Ruling Is Victory for Progressives.

SAYS ACT DISCRIMINATES Flat Number of Signatures for Independent Nominations Called Unjust.

The Progressive party won, under a decision by Supreme Court Justice Tompkins yesterday, its contention that certain clauses of the Levy election law are unconstitutional. These are clauses which would have operated against the Progressives this fall in getting their local candidates before the voters.

Justice Tompkins refused, however, to admit the contention of the Progressives that a requirement of 800 signatures to an independent nomination for member of Assembly was unreasonable.

On the argument of this motion Mr. Levy whose name the present law bears, very frankly stated that the purpose of the present law was to make independent nominations more difficult. That, however, is contrary to the spirit of our institutions and the underlying principle of our State Constitution and the decisions of the court of appeals during the last few years.

Justice Tompkins' decision was rendered on a motion for a writ of mandamus directed against John Smith and James E. Towner, the two candidates for the Board of Elections in Putnam county. The writ was brought by William H. Hotchkiss, State chairman of the Progressive party, and Hamilton A. Smith, county chairman of the Empire State Democratic party.
