

**REBEL GENERAL FLEES  
IN AMERICAN'S AUTO**

**Campa, Pursued by Mexican  
Federals, Commands to Be  
Driven to Safety.**

**COWBOYS' HORSES STOLEN**

**Residents of Looted Altar Dis-  
trict, Facing Starvation—  
Orozo Sr. at El Paso.**

EL PASO, TEX., Sept. 21. Emil Hockworth, an American pressed into service along with his auto, saved Emilio P. Campa, a Mexican rebel leader, from being made a prisoner by the Federals under Col. Giron on Wednesday. Pursued closely Campa forced the American to take him in his automobile to safety.

Campa's desertion of his men is described in a message from Altar, which states that when the Federals were on the heels of the fleeing rebels, after the rout of the latter by Giron, Campa met the American. He forced Hockworth to turn about and take him out of danger, leaving his men to shift for themselves. Hockworth took Campa to a point near Querobabi on the Sonora Railway.

The Altar district is in a serious predicament because of its great isolation and the thorough looting of the district by the rebels. The residents are facing starvation. In their flight the rebels looted Matibi Ranch, which is owned by an English syndicate. They took all food and all of the horses, leaving the American cowboys marooned on the desert.

The rebels south of Agua Prieta, in Sonora, have gathered a short distance from the border and the commander of the Federal garrison at Agua Prieta fears an attack of the combined forces. The rebels in engagements with Federals under Col. Obregon on Thursday and Friday lost twenty-eight killed. The Federals lost two dead and sixteen wounded.

Col. Pascual Orozo, Sr., father of the rebel leader, together with Jose Cordova, secretary to the general, was brought here tonight by United States officers from Presidio, Tex., where they were arrested last Sunday after fleeing from Ojinaga. They are held here for extradition hearing on the charge of murder preferred by the United States. The murder charge grows out of their alleged execution of Federal spies in Juarez.

Señor Juan Pedro Dilapp, diplomatic representative of the revolutionists in the United States, reached here tonight from Washington to meet Senators Smith and Fall of the United States Senate Mexican investigation committee and to look after other revolutionary matters. He declares if Madero will resign in favor of Francisco I. Madero, former Ambassador to the United States, the revolution in Mexico will end.

MONTEREY, Mexico, Sept. 21.—Confirmation was received here today of the report of the capture of the town of Batopilas, state of Chihuahua, by rebels. The property of the Batopilas Mining Company of New York, in which the sons of the late boss A. R. Sheppard, are largely interested, was looted of money and supplies to the amount of about \$50,000, it is said.

**MEXICAN SITUATION WORSE.**

**Anarchy Reported From All Dis-  
tricts of the Republic.**

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21.—Another wave of anarchy and pillage was reported in the despatches to the State Department today from all portions of Mexico. After a lull in these reports of a few days it now appears that the situation continues to grow worse and that the worst is to be expected.

One of the most significant of the reports told of a defection of a force of 200 Federals under command of Santiago Cambreros, who have gone over to the rebel side. They have joined forces with Campa, the rebel leader who has been among the most active in pillaging operations near the United States border recently. The deserting Federals and Campa's force are now at Bolio.

From Acapulco it is reported that a week ago a large party of Orozo's followers attacked the Laguna ranch and forced the manager and his family to leave, after making them pay over in cash to the rebel leader the sum of \$4,000. This ranch is one of the Rothschild properties and is situated near the mouth of the River Balsas in the State of Michoacan. Rebels have also captured Carrizal in the last few days.

Bands of rebels are again appearing in the States of Jalisco and Mexico, in the latter of which is situated the capital, the city of Mexico. A special train bearing food supplies has succeeded in getting through to Cuernavaca, which has been menaced by Zapatistas.

**YOUNG ITALIANS CLIMB ALPS.**

**1,000 Boys and Girls Chosen by  
Mountaineering Societies.**

The young mountaineers started on Friday, accompanied by guides and ten doctors. They will be roped together in sections of ten in the higher regions. There will be officials in each section to take notes.

**ITALIANS LOSE 200 KILLED.**

zar Oasis in Tripoli.**
