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SHELL EXPLOSION HURTS 8

Men of Third Artillery Injured While at Target Practice.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.—Eight artillerymen of the Third Artillery stationed at Fort Myer, Va., were injured to-day following the premature explosion of a three inch shell while in the gun in target practice at Pocomoke Hills, Toboyanna, Pa.

The man most seriously injured is Private Erbeck, who is being brought to the army hospital in this city.

Two of the men received their injuries in the collapse of the observation stand on which they were stationed, which was struck by the bursting gun.
