

SENATOR RAYNER DEAD AFTER LONG ILLNESS

Noted in Congress as One of the Most Effective Speakers.

REED'S UNIQUE TRIBUTE

Counsel for Admiral Schley in Inquiry Following Spanish War.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25.—Senator Istler Rayner of Maryland died at his home in this city at 6:29 A. M. today following a long fight against a complication of diseases.

Senator Rayner was born in Baltimore, April 11, 1851. He was educated at the University of Virginia.

He was elected to the State Senate in 1886 and to Congress in the same year. He served for three terms.

While in Congress Mr. Rayner served as a member of the Committee on Foreign Affairs, the Committee on Weights and Measures and the Commerce Committee.

After leaving the national House of Representatives Mr. Rayner was elected Attorney-General of Maryland in 1894 after a hot contest.

As counsel for Admiral Schley in the naval inquiry which followed the battle of Santiago he made a national reputation.

On March 4, 1905, Mr. Rayner took his seat in the United States Senate. He occupied the spotlight here, as he had occupied it in the lower house of Congress.

Senator Rayner suffered a nervous breakdown at his summer home, Algonquin Manor, in August, 1911, and although he recovered from this his vitality was never so great thereafter.

FRANK HALL SCOTT.

Connected With Century Co.—Well-Known Publisher.

Frank Hall Scott, president of the Century Company, died yesterday at his home, 57 West Tenth street.

Mr. Scott was born in Terre Haute, Ind., in 1847. He went into business in that State after finishing his education at the Pennsylvania Military Academy.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Julia Draper Davis Scott, and two sons, Donald, who is treasurer of the Century Company, and Clement, an attorney in Hartford, Conn.

SIR HORACE EDWARD MOSS.

Pioneer of Modern English Music Hall Is Dead.

Special Cable Despatch to THE SUN. LONDON, Nov. 25.—Sir Horace Edward Moss, the pioneer of the modern English music hall and known as "the Napoleon

of Entertainers," is dead at the age of 60. He was chairman of Moss's Empire Music Halls in London and in other cities.

Sir Horace Edward Moss was educated in Edinburgh and Glasgow and his home had been for many years at Middleton Hall, Gorebridge, Scotland.

Some two years ago, with Oswald Stoll, another controller of vaudeville theatres in England, he opened negotiations with John Cort, then controlling two circuits in the Northwest, with the idea of later invading that territory.

He gave a great dinner last New Year at the Hotel Richeville in London at which a sensation was created when a large party was cut out of it.

WILLIAM F. MONYPENNY.

Director of London "Times" Is Dead in London.

LONDON, Nov. 25.—William Flavell Monypenny, director of the Times Publishing Company, died to-day.

Mr. Monypenny's first literary work was as a contributor to the Spectator. In 1863 he was made assistant editor of the Times and following that in 1866 he was appointed editor of the London Standard.

This appointment was the occasion of his entering the Boer War, for at the outbreak of hostilities he obtained a commission in the Imperial Light Horse.

Mr. Monypenny was born in 1826, the second son of William Monypenny of Ballyworkan, County Armagh.

George B. Watts.

George B. Watts, senior partner in the brokerage and banking business house of Goodbody & Co., 30 Broadway, died yesterday at Hot Springs, Va., where he had been taken in the hope of recovery from a long illness of trichinosis.

Mr. Watts was 44 years old. He had been engaged in Wall Street from 1850 to 1852, at the age of 19 he was with the firm of C. P. Thompson & Co. as a clerk, and in 1851 he became a partner in the firm of Robert Goodbody & Co.

The Rev. Dr. G. W. Phillips.

BOSTON, Nov. 25.—The Rev. Dr. George Whitfield Phillips, first pastor of the First Methodist Episcopal Church in Worcester, died on Sunday in Shrewsbury, at the age of 74.

Mr. Phillips was graduated from Amherst College in 1837 and from Andover Theological Seminary in 1841. His first pastorate was at the Congregational Church at Haverhill.
