However, it is not to be surmised that you play the man who tries to play you, but on the contrary you block one of his teammates while he is attempting to follow you.


ADVANCED BASKETBALL PLAYS TO THWART OPPOSING GUARDS

In diagramming the plays the Reds, represented by black circles, designate the defensive team; the Blues, represented by the checkered circles, represent the offensive team.

This diagram illustrates a signal of the center for the left guard to get the ball from the center to the right.



This diagram shows the completion of the play started in the first diagram. The checkered forwards cross to opposite sides of the court, running back toward the goal, the right forward crossing behind the left.




In this diagram is shown the method of attack when the ball is thrown out on the defensive side.




This shows the play in execution. The center, who has taken out the ball, passes it to the forward, who runs to meet the ball, making the pass as short as possible.


This diagram represents the lineup for the crisscross attack when the black team causes ball to be thrown out of bounds at the sides of the court.



This shows the play in execution. The center, who has taken out the ball, passes it to the forward, who runs to meet the ball, making the pass as short as possible.




This sketch shows the same play from the extremity of the court under the basket of the opponents or Reds' goal.


