In Special Message to Legislature Says State Must Conserve Its Resources.

CALLS STATUTE INVALID

Declares It Confers Nearly Three-Quarters of State's Entire Water Powers.

ALBANY, Jan. 13.—Gov. Sulzer in a special message transmitted to the Legislature to-night recommends the repeal of Chapter 355 of the Laws of 1907...

It has been estimated that 1,600,000 horse-power will be developed at the Long Sault Rapids, and half of this will go to the Canadian Government for disposal...
