Single Tax Club Asks Him to Pay Sums Alleged to Be Due on \$150,000,000 Bonds.

The Manhattan Single Tax Club sent a letter to Andrew Carnegie recently on the subject of the amount of taxes he paid.

Considering your great gifts for public purposes during these ten years, it seems safe to assume that your average holding of personal property, upon which the laws of New York require you to pay an average tax of 1 1/2 per cent, has not been less than \$200,000,000 over and above the comparatively small sum upon which you have paid.

It would seem therefore that you should have paid \$300,000,000 per annum in taxes more than you did pay, or in all not less than \$3,000,000. This sum, lawfully and morally due from your fellow citizens, every dweller in your swarming tenements has had to pay part of it.

The club believes that only land values ought to be taxed, but it also believes that the law is and ought to be supreme and that as long as it requires the payment of taxes upon personal property no citizen, however rich or poor, should be permitted to disobey the law.

In conclusion the club said it hoped that Mr. Carnegie would be led to pay back to the city the \$30,000,000 he seemed to owe.

Mr. Carnegie's reply, made public yesterday, was to the effect that he had first been taxed on \$5,000,000 and later on \$10,000,000, which he had paid.

"These taxes," he wrote, "amount an assessment of 40 per cent upon the total revenue of the bonds. This was not taxation but confiscation."

Mr. Carnegie said he had paid every demand made upon him under both the old and the new law.

The club in reply wrote as follows: We do not think that because a tax was 40 per cent upon the income yield of your bonds it should not have been paid.

The average land tax, under which other great fortunes besides yours have grown up, is over 10 per cent upon the principal. We appreciate the fact that you have acted conscientiously and have given the American people much more than you owe the people of New York city, but we regret that you have not set a shining example to your class by paying the city of New York the law abiding you pay.

FIFTH WIFE ASKS ALIMONY. Mrs. Charles Hurst Brings Suit for Separation.

Supreme Court Justice Kapper in a Brooklyn court yesterday reserved decision for \$50 a week alimony and \$1000 counsel fee on behalf of Mrs. Clara Hurst pending the trial of her counter suit for separation against Charles Hurst, 60 years old, president of the Hurst Electric Company of Manhattan, for alleged cruel treatment.

The couple were married in Wilmington, Del., in 1905 and have a five-year-old daughter.

It was the second matrimonial venture of the plaintiff, the wife, it is said, of the aged defendant, who had one son, his wife's charges but avers that she was in the habit of keeping him a prisoner in the house and kicking him around or forcing him out, no matter if it was raining or snowing.
