

30,000 CHILDREN GO TO SCHOOL HUNGRY

Committee Finds That Is About the Number in Brooklyn.

1,000 GET NO BREAKFAST

Move to Have the City Furnish Lunches in Some of the Schools.

Sixteen young women of the Junior League, headed by Mrs. Bayard Litchfield, who have been investigating during the past two months conditions in twelve Brooklyn schools in regard to the nourishment of the children, have made their reports to the Bureau of Charities.

The young women went in pairs to twelve schools and submitted formulated questions to the principals and in turn to the teachers. These were among the questions:

- "How many children get milk for breakfast?"
- "How many tea or coffee and bread?"
- "How many receive money from their parents to buy lunch?"
- "How many receive a penny and how many more?"

It was found that in some of the schools a large percentage of the children go home to their lunch and that about one-quarter of the children receive a cent or more to spend on lunches. In one school it was found that of the 972 children 472 had only tea or coffee and bread for breakfast.

The committee sets forth in its report that of the 8,700 children in the twelve schools visited 131 came to school without breakfast and 3,175 with only tea or coffee and bread. From these figures the committee concludes that the army of school children in Brooklyn 30,000 go to school in the morning insufficiently nourished and 1,000 without any breakfast.

The facts gathered in this investigation will be presented to the Board of Education with a request that it ask the Board of Estimates for sufficient money to equip at least a half dozen schools in Brooklyn with facilities for school lunches.

Mrs. E. Cox, chairman of the school lunch committee and secretary of the local school board, says that the reason why children go to school on light lunches is partly because of the ignorance of parents, partly because of poverty and partly because of the hurry of the day. James Jenkins, Jr., of the Bureau of Charities, says that by careful buying and supervision the school lunches could be made to pay for themselves.

\$34,090 FINES BANKRUPT FIRM.

Creamey Co. Unable to Pay Penalties for Skimming Milk.

Nathan Abramson, living at Dunraven, Delaware county, N. Y., and Aaron Florent, residing at 241 Fox street, Timonium, who were formerly milk dealers in this city with a creamery at Shavertown, N. Y., under the trade style of the Shavertown Creamery Company, have filed a petition in bankruptcy, with liabilities \$31,000 and no assets.

All the liabilities are for penalties and costs assessed by the State for skimming milk and neglecting to mark cans in shipping as containing skimmed milk. The Attorney-General got a judgment against them on February 7, 1911, of \$17,241 in Delaware county. They appealed, but the judgment was affirmed with \$25 costs. The other penalties are \$18,800 and costs estimated at \$100.

They discontinued business as a firm in 1909 and paid all their liabilities except these penalties. They afterwards incorporated the Shavertown Creamery Company on January, 1910, with capital stock \$6,000, with Mr. Abramson president and Mr. Florent treasurer, which company has since continued the business, both in this city and in Delaware county.

J. L. KESNER CREDITORS MEET.

Final Acceptance of Bid is Put off Until May 10.

There was another hearing yesterday on the matter of J. L. Kesner Company, dry goods department store at Sixth avenue and Twenty-second street, before Judge Mayer in the United States District Court, which was attended by about 200 creditors and attorneys.

The question of the final acceptance of the bid of the Twenty-third Street Stores Company for the assets at a price sufficient to pay creditors 20 cents on the dollar was postponed until next Saturday.

Since the tentative acceptance of the bid the landlord wanted taxes amounting to \$25,000, which the bid had not provided for, and there were questions as to the lien of judgment creditors. Judge Mayer said he would hear counsel on these questions on Wednesday.

Robert C. Marsh, attorney for several newspapers, asked to have the assets appraised by some person independent of the receiver's appraisal and Judge Mayer granted the request.

In answer to a question of Judge Mayer Mr. Price, the receiver, said they were losing at the rate of \$1,000 a day in carrying on the business.

If the business was to be closed down he wanted to have at least eight hours notice, as he thought the 700 employees were entitled to that much notice and he did not want to throw an army like that on the street without any notice.

BURGLARS WORK NEAR TOMBS.

Get \$600 in Jewelry in a Lafayette Street Cigar Store.

Burglars who worked under the nose of police and within fifty feet of the Tombs prison, opened a safe in the cigar store of Henry Lowenthal at 43 Lafayette street Friday night and got \$600 in jewelry.

William Daehsler, who runs a lunch counter next door, at 45 Lafayette street, reported to the police yesterday that a number of cooking utensils had been stolen. The crackers he baked for Daehsler's food, but did not bother to wash the dishes. The police said both jobs were amateurish. No arrests were made yesterday.

SAYS BISHOP IS IN CONTEMPT.

Wife Alleges Banker Refuses to Pay Alimony as Ordered.

An order directing James Cunningham Bishop, member of the banking firm of Redmond & Co., to show cause why he should not be punished for contempt for not paying the \$300 alimony due to his wife, Abigail, was signed yesterday by Supreme Court Justice Lehman and is returnable on May 6.

Mrs. Bishop, whose divorce suit is expected to come to trial this week, says that her husband has refused to pay the alimony, although demand has been made for it by her attorney.

Rush for Bonds Sold Over Counter.

PHILADELPHIA, May 3.—A rush of investors filled the office of City Treasurer Tobbia today and succeeded in buying more than \$1,000,000 of the first half of the \$1,000,000 municipal loan. The day's total was \$1,069,000.
