CARDINALS SHUT OUT THE GIANTS

Topple Matty With Bunting and Other Records of Their Bats.

TWO HITS OFF HARMON

Change of Pace Used by That Pitcher to Discomfiture of Champions.

NOBODY AT SECOND BASE

That Is, None of the Home Talent Is Able to Travel That Far.

The first appearance here of the Cardinals was decidedly impressive. Huggins' husters rode rough shod over the Giants and shut them out.

Speaking of "inside" ball the Cardinals adopted it yesterday to the confusion and defeat of the Giants. The varied and clever hitting of the batters in something for which the Giants had no defense and in playing circles around the champions and winning by a score of 8 to 0.

Then there was Bob Harmon. The St. Louis pitcher had a change of pace which reduced the New York bats to so many straws. He had a habit of putting the first ball over the batter in a hole without loss of time and he cut speed and slow tossers which the Giants did not know how to set themselves for and couldn't hit safely if they did.

No other Giants reached first in the one sided tussle with Harmon's magic and none of them reached second base. Probably there was some reaction in the New York camp from two extra inning games, but if there was Harmon was responsible for part of it. He thoroughly outmaneuvered the home hitters. The Cardinals mixed up their hitting. Mathewson and detest the veteran delivery freely. Matty was off and the Cardinals were on. Good fielding drove them away from the bases in the fourth inning, but in the fifth the decided sprang a leak and the Cardinals bunted and bled their way to two runs. It was all their way from that on.

The fielding of the visiting band was snappy and ready. Matty's game was close and going with renewed dash when they began to look like winners. Six innings of pitching brought evidence that Matty couldn't hold them and Willie Wagner, who had pitched well before the game was over. Their bats laid plans well and as the Giants weren't hitting the game was just such a landslide as struck them in their opening contest of the year.

Lee Magee went into the corner back of the left wing of the grand stand and collided Doyle's foul in the second inning, which was one evidence of the mood of the Cardinals after an unbroken series of reverses in Brooklyn. Magee brought the ball out to show Kieker that he had caught it, as in the old days of "judgment," but that wasn't necessary, for Byron could see Koney inaugurated the St. Louis bunting with a perfect job of that kind in the second inning and Oakes whacked a single to right. Whitted forced Koney at first and Willie Wagner, who had pitched well before his potent arm, reveals in chances of this kind, and he threw Oakes out at the plate.

Wingo was turned back stalling, and as the Cardinals couldn't get anything with Matty in the next two innings they were compelled to hold their peace until the fifth.

It was in the fifth that the Cardinals first employed the trick of advantage. Rebel Oakes singled and Whitted received Herzog into a fumble. Wingo added a half bunt along to Fletcher and easily beat it out. That filled the bases, but the side could have been retired without a run with steady fielding. Harmon bunted to Matty and Oakes were forced at the plate. Meyers threw to first for a double play, but carried on the ball of Harmon, Oakes and Whitted scored. Miller, Evers and Huggins grounded to Doyle, whose throw home was muffed by Meyers, but was too late anyway to retire Kieker. Magee bunted the bases safe, but Matty struck out Shekard and threw out Morley.

Koney, alias the Big Train, didn't consider it beneath him to take the four ball route to first in the sixth inning. Oakes sacrificed and Whitted doubled, left. The Big Train steamed home. Whitted advanced on Wingo's out and Harmon had the check to burn. He too, laid down a safe one, forcing Whitted. Matty retired when the bunting was over, but not until Harmon had bunted safely on to be forced by Magee.

In the eighth two bases on balls off Huggins, a force and a bagger by Huggins found two more Cardinals clambering to the plate. Burns had the range of Huggins' drive until he lost it in the ninth. Morley doubled, Kieker and Koney's single was all he needed for a run. Whitted's hit, also to left, brought
