IS OSAKA A JAPANESE SPY?

War correspondents invaded Staten Island yesterday to unravel the mystery of Kato Osako, who was picked up by a lifeboat of the Hamburg-American motor ship Christian X, off Fort Wadsworth at 1:30 o'clock yesterday morning.

QUEENS JUST OFF BROADWAY AND KINGS HIGHWAY LINKED TO TENDERLOIN.

The approximate schedule of running times on the lines of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit system was announced yesterday.

As computed by J. Dempsey, transportation engineer, who is also superintendent of transportation of the New York Consolidated Railroad Company, the B. R. T. subway operating concern, this schedule brings the parts of Brooklyn and Queens, served by the Brooklyn system, into closer communication with Manhattan than ever before.

Through the Broadway subway in Manhattan and the Centre street loop line from the Williamsburg Bridge, under Delancey, Centre, Nassau and Broad streets to Whitehall street, large facilities of distribution is afforded for traffic between Manhattan and Brooklyn.

Fifty-ninth street will be only fifteen minutes distant from the Dekalb avenue station of the Fourth avenue subway, which runs through Brooklyn's greatest traffic point, Flatbush avenue and Fulton street.

Passengers from Fifty-ninth street, Manhattan, and those from intervening points, can reach Flatbush in twenty-four minutes, and Coney Island in forty minutes. The territory embracing Borough Park, New Utrecht and Bath Beach is to be brought within thirty or thirty-five minutes of Fifty-ninth street Manhattan, and Bay Ridge, at the extreme end of the Fourth avenue subway, will be within thirty minutes from Fifty-ninth street.

The Queensboro routes bring the northern part of Queens Borough into a few minutes' ride with the business, hotel and theatrical centres of Manhattan. From Corona to Woodside by express will be a four-minute ride. From Woodside to the Queensboro Bridge plaza five minutes more. From Queensboro Bridge plaza it will take six minutes to get across the bridge on account of the fifteen mile limit for speed on that structure, making a total of fifteen minutes to the Manhattan end of the Queensboro Bridge.

Five minutes more will bring the Queensboro passengers to Times Square, four minutes additional to Fourteenth street, another four minutes to the City Hall and three minutes from there to Whitehall street, making a total running time by express of thirty-one minutes from Jackson avenue, Corona, to the southern end of Manhattan island. A similar schedule may be maintained over the Astoria extension.
