

DESERT CHANTS SUNG AT ARAB BOY'S GRAVE

Buried in Brooklyn. Far From the Sandy Fastness of His Fathers.

ENVIED OF HIS PEOPLE Crouched Under an Oak Tree Hymn the Joy of the Soul That Is With Allah.

There was a Mohammedan funeral yesterday in Cypress Hills cemetery, Brooklyn. Fifty Moroccans in their desert dress were there. So many were there that one imagined the green turf had become the basalt mountains of the Atlas Mountains, that the oaks and elms were broad spreading palm leaves instead of fluffy foliage, and that the blue sky of the occidant had miraculously turned to a blaze of gold wonder.

No doubt that is what the desert tribesmen saw. Their heads hung low, all sang weird cantatas. Yet there was little that was funereal about their bearing or the proceedings generally. They were reserved, silent, mysterious. A Westerner thinks an Arab should be noisy. They did not deign to notice the throng of curious idlers who followed them into the cemetery andaped with New World meddlesomeness into the grave.

ROBIN'S FREEDOM DENOUNCED.

Deputy Wright Says His Daily Absence From Tomb Is an "Outrage."

Joseph G. Robin denied yesterday the report that for four months he has spent his nights in the Tombs and most of the days in the office of his attorney, Robert D. Ireland, at 85 William street. He is also positive that he has not been eating course meals in a restaurant when he ought to be eating coarse meals with the other prisoners on Blackwell's Island, to which he was sent for a year.

Robin insists that the limited freedom allowed him has been spent in the interests of the creditors of the various institutions with which he was connected. His efforts in this direction, Robin said, have antagonized Wall Street interests, who have formed a conspiracy to get him back to Blackwell's Island and keep him shut out of the courts. He claims to have received several threats that he will be "handed something" if he doesn't desist. Robin, accompanied by Keeper Norton, came down to the Federal Building yesterday morning to give testimony in the examination of James T. Wood at the bankruptcy hearing before United States Commissioner Gilchrist. He found, however, that the subpoenaed by Judge Mayer of the United States District Court, and the hearing was adjourned.

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
