King George Welcomes President of France at Victoria Station.

PAGE ATTENDS BANQUET

Peace Is Keynote of Speeches at Buckingham Palace Reception.

When Poincaré sailed into Portsmouth he found a number of Great Britain's most modern warships gathered in his honor.

The distinguished visitor and the Prince listened to an address of welcome from the civic authorities of Portsmouth, after which they boarded the royal train for London.

The banquet given by King George in honor of President Poincaré at Buckingham Palace to-night was an exceptionally elaborate affair.

The King in offering a toast to the French President referred in an appreciative manner to the warmth of the relations between England and France...

Case of Peace Chief of All. "The two nations have been drawn together by a growing sense of unity of interest and identity of purpose."

President Poincaré's reply was along similar lines and emphasized the close ties of France and England in recent months to preserve the peace.

France, like England, has the happiness working for peace with the personal cooperation of all the chancellors, and will continue to work with the same good will so that harmony may not be disturbed in the future."



DUKE OF SUTHERLAND'S CONDITION IS CRITICAL

Fourth Bearer of Title Is in His Sixty-second Year.

Cromartie Sutherland-Leveson-Gower, the fourth Duke of Sutherland, will be 62 years old on July 20 next.

The Duke of Sutherland is perhaps the largest real estate owner in Great Britain. His holdings aggregate 1,358,000 acres, title to nearly one-sixteenth of Scotland being in his name.

When the Duke visited this country last year he brought with him the old eagle sternpiece of the yacht America, which he presented to the New York Yacht Club.

EARL OF GRANARD GOT THREAT. Woman in Letter Menaced Life of Miss Denise Greville.

Special Cable Dispatch to The Sun LONDON, June 24.—Theodore Mary Tichborne, who represented herself to be a daughter of Arthur Orton, the famous Tichborne claimant, was charged in Bow street court to-day with having sent to the Earl of Granard, who married Miss Beatrice Mills of New York, a letter in which she threatened to murder Miss Denise Greville, who is to be married to Sir Joseph Tichborne in Brompton Oratory to-morrow.

When the charge was read Miss Tichborne said: "I am glad it has come to a crisis. I had no intention of harming Miss Greville and only wanted to bring her before the public."

King Peter May Lose Throne. War Party in Serbia Angered by His Peace Policy.

MURRAY SCOTT WILL CONTEST IS BEGUN

Brother of Sir John Attacks Document on Ground of Undue Influence.

ESTATE WORTH \$5,000,000

Entire Fortune Was Left to Lady Sackville of Knole Park, Kent.

Special Cable Dispatch to The Sun LONDON, June 24.—The Probate Court was thronged to-day by members of society at the hearing on the question of admitting to probate the will of Sir John Murray Scott, who left a \$5,000,000 estate to Lady Sackville of Knole Park, Kent, wife of Baron Sackville.

The probate of the will is opposed by Malcolm Scott, a brother of the decedent, on the ground of undue influence. He has offered a reward of \$50,000 for the production of a codicil which he says Sir John executed after signing the original document.

The Right Honorable Frederick E. Smith in opening the remarkable case on behalf of Malcolm Scott declared that it would be contended that the Sackvilles had been a decade in gaining such an influence over Sir John, who was not related to them in any way.

JUDGE MOORE AGAIN AHEAD. J. B. McLean and J. S. Draper Alan Win at Olympia.

MEHNARTO EXPLAINS HIS CONTRATOXIN

Describes Four Year Treatment of Pulmonary Tuberculosis Patients in London. RESULTS ARE HOPEFUL.

Bacteriolytic Serum Was Found After Trial of Hundreds of Plasma Combinations.

Special Cable Dispatch to The Sun LONDON, June 24. Dr. Frederick Mehnarto, the young bacteriologist, sends the following letter to the Lancet describing his new serum, contratoxin, which, it has been claimed, is harmless in application and will effectually cure any disease which is due to microorganisms in the blood, and its employment in treating tuberculosis.

NAME APPLIES TO OTHERS. "Contratoxin is a mixture of the blood plasma of various animals mixed in proportions calculated to produce a lytic action on various microorganisms without producing lysis of the human red corpuscles."

REFRACTORY ANIMAL'S PLASMA USED. "As a general principle we used as the basis of the serum employed in the treatment of any disease the plasma of an animal known to be refractory to that particular disease."

HOPEFUL RESULTS OBTAINED. "The treatment of pulmonary tuberculosis is in other hands than mine and until the preliminary report is ready for publication I can say no more at present than that the results of the treatment are most hopeful and encouraging."
