

LARCHMONT MECCA FOR YACHT RACERS

Annual Race Week Begins Next Saturday in Open Regatta for All Classes.

CRAFT TO COME FROM AFAR Special Race for Women—Tilt On to Get Members for Atlantic Club.

Larchmont is the harbor in which nearly all the fast racing craft and many of the yachts will head this week. Larchmont's race week will open next Saturday, and will continue every day except on Sunday and Tuesday.

This year, in addition to those that regularly sail on the Sound, yachts will go to Larchmont from Massachusetts Bay, Narragansett Bay, Gravesend Bay, the Hudson River and the Delaware River. The largest motor yacht, the "Perry," is expected to arrive from Narragansett Bay.

The regatta committee, headed by E. Boucher, Lawrence P. Dwyer, Jr., and Kerr, is figuring that the fleet this year will be a record breaker. There never have been as many yachts racing in these waters as there are this season and if 125 of last year's fleet still be in the new boats it will mean that there will be nearly 200 starters in the races.

Other special prizes have been offered by former Commodore Leonard Richards, former Commodore Wilson Marshall, former Vice-Commodore George M. Lynchon, Capt. Zeb Mayhew and Capt. W. T. Mars.



WESTWARD HO WILL GO MOTOR BOAT MEN

Perry Centennial Races to Be at Put-in Bay and Toledo Week of July 27.

MAGNET TO EASTERNERS Large Number Will Take Best of Their Boats to Meet Stars of West.

There will be a general exodus of motor boats from these waters to the lakes this week. The racing in connection with the Perry centennial celebration at Toledo and Put-in Bay will begin on Monday, July 27, and there will be present the largest fleet of motor yachts ever collected in the world.

At Put in Bay there will be four days of racing. The challenge trophies of the Manufacturers Association will be competed for in high speed boats in a race in their usual divisions, there will be a cruising race from Toledo, where will be two days of racing.

While the trial races were in progress at Huntington last week Mr. Hand received the following telegram from Brand Wall, chairman of the centennial celebration executive committee:

"We extend through you to all owners of power boats and hydroplanes, interested in the British International trial races at Huntington a cordial invitation to participate in our Perry Centennial regatta. Our races will be run over the beautiful Maurice River, which rivals the Hudson and the Sound as an attractive racecourse. The course will be policed by revenue cutters. Twenty-four railroads reach Toledo and shipping arrange-

ments are unexcelled. There are ample facilities for loading and unloading from cars. The trip to Toledo is assured all day some by the five associated yacht clubs of Toledo, by the centennial committee and by the Illinois Yacht Club. The trip to Put in Bay is assured by the centennial committee of the East on July 25 and 26."

Mr. Hand replied and told a few of the yachtsmen who had promised to go to Toledo. He said that the Perry Centennial races are a cruising race and the Cinderella is a speed boat of class A of the displacement type. The Peter Pan V will go to the lakes if it is not sent to England to try and win back the British International trophy.

Harry L. Maxwell's Avenger and Robert Treat Paine's Shimma in one class, H. G. S. Noble's Medora and George I. Natchez's Dorinda in another, and the nine 50 footers will furnish racing at Larchmont worth going miles to see.
