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MINGLE MANGLE, SAYS GAYNOR

Mayor Says He Describes the Fusion Committee of 10.

Mayor Gaynor said in an interview published yesterday in the Brooklyn Eagle that the fusion committee of 10 was a "mingle mangle" committee.

For light on the meaning of "mingle mangle" the Mayor referred the interviewer to one of the most old Hugh Lattimer's sermons to the King.

"They" (the committee) continued the Mayor, "professed to want non-partisanship in the city government, but they would not consider my name, or the name of any one, unless we first made a pledge that we would not permit any Democratic support. I undertake to say that every man of normal mind knows that was dishonest."

Mr. Gaynor declared that the Becker case will not play a part in the campaign as an issue. He said everybody knows that in a police force of 10,000 there will be some corrupt men, but there are corrupt lawyers, corrupt bankers, corrupt merchants, corrupt newspaper proprietors, &c.

He declined to comment on the candidacy of John Purroy Mitchell other than to say: "I have always treated Mr. Mitchell nicely, and tried always to work with him, and get of himself the best. Did he always treat me in the same way?"

ARNOLD SUBPENAED; MAY NOT BE CALLED

Assembly Committee Probably Won't Ask Him To-day About Bribery Charges.

Ex-Judge Lynn J. Arnold, publisher of the Albany Knickerbocker Press, who has been subpoenaed to testify before the Assembly Committee on Monday, will not appear, it is known that the charge that votes for Gov. Sulzer's impeachment were obtained by bribery, came down from Albany last night and went to the Union League Club.

At a speech at a league dinner at the Knickerbocker Hotel I said that the word 'radical' from 'radex', a root, had been discredited by the extremists who wished not so much to get at the root of anything as to tear up the roots of everything."

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MCCALL STILL URGES WHITMAN.

If District Attorney Accepts It Will Be Without Condition.

Talk for the nomination of District Attorney Whitman on the Tammany ticket to succeed himself was strong yesterday. There seems no doubt that the Democratic county committee will select him. Ex-Judge E. E. MacCall's candidate for Mayor on the Democratic ticket, said emphatically in East Hampton that he is urging the nomination of Mr. Whitman because the District Attorney's splendid work must be continued.

Mr. Whitman himself, when reached by long distance telephone at Bretton Woods, refused to discuss the probability of Tammany selecting him on its ticket.

MARSH QUILTS PROGRESSIVES.

Resigns from County Committee and Says Platform is a Straddle.

Benjamin C. Marsh of 329 Broadway has resigned from the county committee of the National Progressive party. In a letter which he sent to Francis W. Bird, chairman of the county committee, he charges that the Progressive party has placed itself in the same category with Tammany Hall and the Republican party.

He accuses the party of being a straddle, and is not anti-Tammany but anti-monopoly, and that the Progressive party in its platform has announced itself as pro-monopoly and pro-privilege in this city.

"Our platform in this municipal campaign," he writes to Mr. Bird, "is a straddle. It makes it perfectly clear to the honest people that we have the form of justice but deny the power thereof."

"Two of the great issues before the people are the franchise monopoly and exploitation and land monopoly and exploitation. On neither of these does the Progressive party dare come out openly. As a member of the platform committee I realized that the platform committee was controlled by land speculators."

"The action of the city convention in refusing to let the delegates to the convention decide whether or not to have a municipal plank submitting to a referendum the question of the ownership of the ground rent for the expenses of the city showed that the party is controlled by land speculators."

"I decline, however, since I have my self-respect to maintain, to be a party fooling the people under the name of the Progressive party."

"As you know, the Progressives of New Jersey are fighting for the principle. The Progressive party in this State is occupied in seeking the tests of privilege, and just darning monopoly out of the corner of its mouth."

ANTI-SULZER MAN LOSES.

Assemblyman Maloney Refused a Renomination in the Primaries.

Because he voted for the impeachment of Gov. Sulzer and against the direct primary bill Assemblyman Thomas H. Maloney of Great Neck Station will not be nominated by the Democrats of Nassau county next year.

SULZER SAYS HE HAS NO FEAR OF RESULT

Governor Discusses Impeachment in Letter to Representative Lafferty.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 24.—Gov. Sulzer of New York commented on the impeachment proceedings in which he is involved in a personal letter to Representative Walter Lafferty of Washington, with whom he served in Congress, dated August 18 and made public by Mr. Lafferty. Gov. Sulzer's communication was in reply to a letter of sympathy and encouragement from the Washington Representative.

"My dear Congressman: Thanks for your letter and your encouraging words about the struggle here to give the people of New York honest government."

"You have no conception of the obstacles in my way. Neither have you any idea of the difficulties that beset me. I am sick at heart, but their words of assurance like yours come to hand and I take renewed hope to go forward with determination—come what may."

"When the political boss found out that he could not control me and make me a rubber stamp he did everything he could to destroy me politically. He has never, I have no fear of the political boss. The truth will prevail and right makes right. In the future as in the past you and all my friends can rely on me to do my duty as I see the light and God gives me the light regardless of personal consequences."

"The graters are sounding me, Mr. Murphy and his henchmen are trading me and trying in every conceivable way to get me to throw up. However, I can assure you these little things are no bother to me. I have made up my mind to stay in the game. My friends in the newspapers about me are biased and pure falsification. They know this and they know it will not in the least analysis hurt me, but they know it concerns me and worries Mrs. Sulzer."

"When Boss Murphy told me he would give me a good government I was glad to accept it. With the aid of the decent people of the State I shall go forward. I cannot do otherwise."

NO PROBE BY CONGRESS.

House Lacks Authority to Investigate Sulzer's Acts.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 24.—Members of the Committee on the Judiciary said tonight that the House has no authority to investigate charges that may be made affecting acts performed by William Sulzer while he was a sitting member of Congress. The question arose as the result of newspaper publications to the effect that a resolution would be presented in the House this week to probe Sulzer's alleged connection with a claim paid to Cuba in August, 1912, to Hugh J. Kelly and allegations that Sulzer took a lively interest in preventing the imposition of a tax on coffee.

"The House lawyers say that if such a resolution is presented it will be pigeon-holed in committee. They say that if at any time after a man has ceased to be a member of the House a sitting member of the House has authority to probe the matter.
