WILLIAMS AND APPRAISALS.

EMILY J. LEVY, president of the Title Insurance Company and for many years deputy comptroller of New York, who died on April 26, 1912, left \$275,828. The residuary estate, amounting to \$257,846, went to his wife, Amelia Harrison Levy, who married him in 1905 after the death of her sister, Mrs. Charles Warren, Mary Speed Bingham and Katherine D. Bishop.

Mr. Levy had \$62,160 in real estate, \$25,000 insurance and securities worth \$171,807. His largest holdings were \$11,000 in stock of the New York Mortgage and Security Company, and \$41,533 of the Bush Terminal Company.

EMILY PIERCE, who died at New Canaan, Conn., on August 1, left her estate to her husband, Margaret J. Gamble of 110 East 112th street and gave nothing to her sister, Adelaide Pierce.

VIOLINA E. WILLIAMS, who died on December 15 last, left \$153,630. She was the widow of George G. Williams and mother of Clara Jay Keech, wife of Frank B. Keech, of the Keech Exchange firm of Keech, Keefe & Co. She left \$35,132 to Mrs. Keech and \$26,292 to the latter's son, George W. Keech. She gave \$5,000 to the Orphan Home and \$2,000 to the Orphan Asylum. A bequest of \$1,000 to her chauffeur, Henry Hildebrand, lapsed because the chauffeur was not in her employ when she died.

CLARA R. ROMAINE, who died on December 25, 1912, in New York, N. Y., left \$122,248. Her son, William J., and her daughter, Mrs. R. Romaine, got the bulk of the estate.

CHARLES E. MARRIAGE, founder of the firm of Charles F. Marriage & Co., fish packers, who died on March 10 last in Hoboken, had a New York estate of \$413,100. He had real estate worth \$25,244, the most valuable parcels being 276 and 285 Greenwich street and 130 West street. He gave the bulk of his estate to his son, Charles H. Marriage, but left a trust and of \$20,000 to his granddaughter, Frances Lillian Marriage.

HENRY W. HUBBARD, treasurer of the American Missionary Association, who died on March 1, 1913, in a safe deposit vault while clipping coupons, had an estate of \$64,131, of which \$38,560 was in securities. His residuary estate, amounting to \$38,999, went to the American Missionary Association. He gave \$5,000 each to the Broadway Tabernacle and the First Congregational Church of Elgin, Ill., and \$1,000 each to Elgin Academy and the Student Christian Association of the University of Michigan.

WILLIAM NEELY, a shoe merchant, left \$25,724 to his wife and children.

Dr. GEORGE A. HAYES left an estate appraised at only \$5,648, but had thousands of shares of worthless mining stocks in a dozen companies.

MARTHA ANN FAY, who died on November 1 last, left \$21,708 to two sons and two grandsons.

FANNIE MEYER left a bequest of \$50 to be paid to a suitable person to say a Hebrew prayer for her soul every day for a year.

MRS. FRANCES METZ DEAD.

Member of Congressman Metz Had a Long and Active Life.

NEWARK, Aug. 29.—Mrs. Frances Metz, mother of ex-Comptroller Herman A. Metz of New York city, died yesterday at the home of her daughter-in-law, Mrs. Samuel F. Metz, 102 Millford avenue. Heart disease was the cause of death. She had been ill since July 18.

Mrs. Metz was 53 years old. She was born in Germany and was the daughter of George and Veronica Hiesel. Her father died at the time of her birth. Her mother lived to be 89 years old. In 1843 Mrs. Metz came to this country with her husband, Edward J. Metz. He was one of the revolutionists who, like Carl Schurz, were forced to flee Germany.

Mrs. Metz always lived an active life. In Germany she had been an instructor in a swimming school and won many medals for her services. She discovered two masked burglars in her home on the night of May 15, 1907, when she was 77 years old. She seized a revolver that was under her pillow in her bedroom and went down stairs, where the burglars had packed two bundles of loot. She fired at them and they jumped out of a window. Ten years before she had a similar encounter with burglars and vanquished them.

Mrs. Metz is survived by three sons, the eldest of whom is Congressman Metz. The other sons are Samuel F. Metz and Dr. Gustave E. Metz of Newark.

The funeral services will be held Saturday afternoon in the chapel of the Lutheran Cemetery, Brooklyn, where interment will take place.

JAMES WALL FINN.

Artist and Mural Decorator Dies in France.

James Wall Finn, the New York artist and interior decorator, whose death on Tuesday at Giverny, near Paris, was reported in a cable despatch in yesterday morning's SUN, had gone to Giverny at the beginning of the summer in the hope of recovering his health.

Mr. Finn was born in New York. He began his art studies here and continued them in Paris. On his return to New York he was attracted to Giverny by his mural decorations and was employed by McKim, Mead & White, the architects, and later by Carrere & Hastings. His work appears in many of the notable residences and public buildings in the city—in the new Public Library, in the new Theatre, now the Century; the Hotel Astor, the Knickerbocker Hotel, in the new Fifth Avenue mansion formerly the home of Col. John Jacob Astor.

Mr. Finn is survived by his wife and three daughters. He was in a house he had leased from the sculptor Frederick MacMonnies.

THOMAS A. VYSE.

Old Time New York Banker Dies at His Country Home.

GLEN RIDGE, N. J., Aug. 29.—Thomas A. Vyse died yesterday of pneumonia at his home, 310 Ridgewood avenue, in his eighty-second year. He was born in England.

Mr. Vyse was president of the Ninth Ward Bank of New York city many years and was formerly a member of the New York Stock Exchange. He lived at Fifth avenue and Thirty-sixth street, New York city, for a long time. He also had a home in Newport and an extensive estate in Westchester county. Up to a year ago Mr. Vyse was connected with the life claims department of the New York Life Insurance Company.

He was one of the original members of the Union Club in Manhattan and belonged to St. George's Church. He was survived by four daughters and two sons, Thomas A. Vyse, Jr., and Arthur S. Vyse. Funeral services will be held Saturday morning at the French Catholic Church, Twenty-third street, New York city.

JAMES J. TOWNSEND.

Ex-President of Chicago Stock Exchange Dies of Apoplexy.

CHICAGO, Aug. 28.—James J. Townsend, 51 years old, ex-president of the Chicago Stock Exchange and prominent in Democratic politics, who was stricken with apoplexy when at luncheon yesterday, died this morning without regaining consciousness.

The broker was born at Lima, Ohio, and came to Chicago when 16 years old. He began work as a horsehoeer's apprentice.
