

LAST OF AMERICAN BUYERS QUIT PARIS

Contented With Their Gleamings of Fashions for the Autumn Season.

HIGH COLORS PREDOMINATE

Far Trimmings of Fox, Leopard, Tiger and Zebra the Vogue.

Special Cable Despatch to The Sun. PARIS, AUG. 30.—The last contingent of representatives of American costume makers left for New York to-day on board the steamship France.

The misunderstanding over the combination among manufacturers for shipping goods direct to America has been satisfactorily explained away by the leaders in this movement.

This new combination of manufacturers, said M. Cheruit, was intended to protect the creators of costumes, not from the foreign receivers of their goods but from the French commissionaire in whose hands the French and German employees have undoubtedly shown their models to Parisian customers.

Consideration for American Type

The advancing of the date of the opening for their convenience was also a party which was very much appreciated by the American buyers.

A characteristic note at Jeanne Lanvin's is showy colors, chiefly cerise and golden yellow, and for the material duvetyn or silk velvet.

Among the innovations which have been received with the greatest favor are the new short separate wraps of velvet, plain and brocaded and trimmed with fur.

STRIKE RIOTING IN DUBLIN.

Sixty or Seventy Clubbed by Police, Taken to Hospitals.

DUBLIN, Aug. 30.—Trouble developed here to-night when the police cleared thousands of street car strikers from the open space in front of Liberty Hall, which is the headquarters of the Transport Workers Union.

The police charged repeatedly and as a result between sixty and seventy rioters were taken to the hospitals. Five policemen were injured.

A warrant has been issued for the arrest of Larkin, one of the leaders of the street car strike, for a seditious speech which he made last night after he had torn up the police proclamation prohibiting the holding of a meeting in Sackville street on Sunday.

ECHO OF PITTSBURG CRASH.

GOODS IN BOND WILL AVOID PAYNE TARIFF

Sutherland's Proposal Is Rejected by a Vote of 85 to 28.

CHILD LABOR IN DEBATE

First Formal Reading of Tariff Bill for Amendment Completed in Senate.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30.—The first formal reading of the Underwood-Simmons tariff bill for amendment was completed in the Senate to-day.

This announcement appears less significant, however, when it is recalled that the bill have been reserved, most of them presenting controversial questions.

Some important issues raised by the tariff bill were settled to-day. Senator Sutherland's proposal to impose duties under the existing Payne-Aldrich law on all goods that have been imported and are now being held in bond was defeated by a vote of 85 to 23.

The modified amendment restricting the importation of goods which are the product of child labor was adopted.

Senator Root strongly dissented to any legislation which proposed to exclude the products of any country for such reason. Senator Kenyon expressed the opinion that before the United States passed legislation excluding the products of child labor in other countries it should legislate to prevent the carrying of the product of child labor in interstate commerce in the United States.

"I will say to the Senator from Iowa," said Senator Borah, "that if we can do it under the Constitution, I have no doubt that the legislation mentioned will be adopted in this country."

The Finance Committee withdrew its amendment giving the United States circuit Courts of Appeal concurrent jurisdiction with the Customs Court in Customs cases.

The Senate adopted the amendment providing for a joint committee of Congress to revise the administrative features of the tariff law.

The action of the Senate committee in striking out the anti-dumping clause in the bill as it passed the House was ratified without question, but it is understood that Senator Pendergast will renew this fight later.

TARIFF REVOLT IN CAUCUS.

Some Democratic Senators Declare Against Ironclad Rule.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30.—A Democratic caucus will be held early next week to go over all of the paragraphs in the tariff bill which were passed over or recommended during the first reading of the bill which ended to-day.

One of the members of the Finance Committee said that he had served notice on his colleagues that he would act independently and vote in accordance with his individual judgment, especially on all matters that do not affect rates or schedules.

This Senator intimated that there were others who felt as he did about the caucus matter, and he predicted that the next two weeks' consideration of the tariff bill will be the most eventful of the session.

SEARCH FOR NOTORIOUS THIEF.
