"For the greater part of the time I was alone. Whenever I needed a guide I employed an Indian to take me on to the didn't trust the Indians very much and I was always on the alert for trouble. I carried a .38 Colt's revolver and I was

ready to use it if occasion had arisen. "These little known Indians were for the most part freindly, although shy, and sometimes sullen. It was difficult to get brush the instant a camera was produced. By giving presents of bacon, sugar and tea was able, though, to get some excellent pictures. Everywhere I went I found the civilized men. They were keen to possess anything I owned. I was offered all sorts of things for the clothes I wore, for mirrors, hairpins, pencils, writing paper-any sort of belonging.

The last of his works was "The Poe Cult and Other Poe Papers," issued in 1909 and containing the result of several years of research work. In 1884 he wrote the "Political Adventures of James G. Blaine."
