The Giants outbatted all four opponents and outscored all but the Pirates. Although they won six more games than the Pirates did the latter made nine more runs. The Pittsburghers had a number of games in the series in which they scored beautifully, and they outfielded the Giants considerably.

The figures for this series were: Runs—New York, 80; Pittsburgh, 59. Hits—New York, 268; Pittsburgh, 206. Errors—New York, 38; Pittsburgh, 36. The Giants won seven games and the Pirates won four. They lost four in each city.
