

Frank Bogash Avoids Tit With Directum I; Gets Victory Instead of Probable Defeat

FRANK BOGASH SHUNS MEETING DIRECTUM I.

Both Are Eligible to Board of Trade Stake, but Bogash Takes Easier Game.

BEST HEATS OF EACH FAST

Columbus for 2:08 Trotters Also Productive of Keen Speed in Every Trial.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Sept. 30.—Directum I and Frank Bogash, Jr., were eligible for the Board of Trade Stake race to-day over the Columbus Grand Circuit track, but the Bogash horse was put into the Army City Stake, thus avoiding a contest with the fast-paced Directum I.

Frank Bogash, Jr., also was a victor in one two three fashion Tommy Murphy let him come along in the third heat in a minute, though Del Rey, the second horse, never was a good contender. The mile, done in 2:02 1/4, was a record making one for the winner.

Directum I took the 2 1/8 pace in straight heats, as he was expected to do. A little excitement was stirred up by the lifting of George Kyger, driver of Del Rey, from the race, but he was easily replaced in two heats. She was third after the switch the three-year-old Homer Ferguson beating her out of the place.

Belmont Spurns Big Offer for Tracery.

AUGUST BELMONT has received an offer of \$200,000 for his great race horse Tracery, which has proved the sensation of the year on the English turf. This, the biggest price ever offered for an American bred thoroughbred, was transmitted by cable and came from the well known breeder and commission agent, Allison. The only stipulation attached is that Tracery should remain unbeaten in his turf career this season.

Sheppard Guardsman Again Report.

Melvin W. Sheppard, who was discharged from the National Guard of New York, will be back in line, according to the latest reports. The rule which specified that a discharged man should be ineligible for a period of five years has been rescinded. Sheppard has felt severely his ostracism from the military ranks and has been anxious to perform again on board fence, wearing the insignia of a New York State regiment. It is said that Sheppard will compete for the Fourteenth Regiment in the military games this winter.

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ENGLAND SPLITS OVER TENNIS-CRICKET CHOICE.

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
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
