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IGNACE PADEREWSKI HEARD ONCE AGAIN

Famous Pianist, Recovered From Illness, Gives Postponed Recital.

BIG AUDIENCE PRESENT

His Art Shows Progress Along Lines Marked Out Years Back.

Ignace Jan Paderewski, the eminent pianist, gave his postponed recital yesterday afternoon in Bolin Hall. It was the first time since he was laid up that he has taken place upon a stage, which developed into a grand success.

His art shows progress along lines marked out years back. The distinguished pianist was last heard here in February, 1905. In that same season his symphony was first performed by the Boston Orchestra. At that time there were some features in Mr. Paderewski's playing which were in the nature of a warning to call for such emphasis as his happy abandonment of the rude forcing of the piano's tone which had marred his art in the previous visit.

Further Charges Disclosed. Artists of Mr. Paderewski's caliber do not stand still. His own recital yesterday disclosed changes in his playing. Between that of 1905 and that of yesterday there was most noticeable his significant difference in the way he treated the letter of the law had a more rigorous respect, although there were some technical shortcomings, due, doubtless, to nerves.

None the less we believe that the audience must have enjoyed better his performance of Schumann's "Carnival," which followed. This composition has unhappily to be accepted by the typical concertgoer as piano music only. What does he know of Beethoven, Chopin, Liszt, and the other great composers?

After the completion of the programme there was the inevitable rush of adorners.
