MILITANTS START A \$300,000 FIRE

Soldiers and Sailors Called Out at Devonport to Fight Flames.

LUMBER YARD BURNED

Sylvia Pankhurst Freed From Jail After Successful "Sleep Strike."

LONDON, Dec. 15.—Soldiers from the barracks and sailors from warships in the harbor were called out today at Devonport Navy Yard to aid the firemen in fighting a \$300,000 blaze started by suffragettes in their campaign of revenge for the rearrest of Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst.

The large lumber yard of Fox, Elliott & Co. at Devonport, near the spot where Mrs. Pankhurst was landed after arrest on the Majestic, was destroyed and several nearby buildings were burned.

DEAN SCORES PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

Says They Turn Out Grumblers and Fault Finders.

Dr. James Earl Russell, dean of the Teachers' college of Columbia University, delivered an arraignment of the American public school system in a lecture before the Columbia Institute today in the Thayer Public Court and was held for trial.

PLACE WATCHED BY POLICE.

Police Officer "Dr." McCulloch Says He Is Watching "Sanitarium" Place.

In the affidavit "Dr." McCulloch says that on November 13 last the police acting under the orders of Deputy Commissioner Newburger, entered her place and arrested three others besides herself on warrants.

STRANGE DOINGS IN A SANITARIUM RELATED.

Court Hears of Hydrotherapy as Administered by "Dr." McCulloch.

The New York Protective and Probation Association, which conducts the Waverly House, at 38 West Tenth street, and of which Miss Marie E. Miner, formerly probation officer of the women's night court, is secretary, won yesterday the first step in a campaign against a so-called sanitarium for treatment by hydrotherapy, conducted by "Dr." Francis McCulloch, a woman who has been arrested twice charged with running a disorderly house but who has always escaped conviction because of insufficient evidence.


