

JAPAN DENIES AIDING HUERTA

Premier Tells "Sun" His Government Sold No Arms to Mexico.

DICTATOR ON GUARD

Troops Scour Capital in Fear of an Armed Uprising.

MEXICO A MONTE CARLO

Gambling Flourishes Again With Sanction of Government.

Japan Denies Report She Is Aiding Mexico.

THE SUN sent a cablegram on Friday to Count Yamamoto, the Japanese Prime Minister, asking him to reply to the statements made at Washington that Japan was aiding President Huerta of Mexico by supplying that country with arms.

"THE SUN, New York:

There is absolutely no truth in the statement that Japan is aiding the Huerta Government by supplying arms. The report perhaps refers to a contract made during June of last year between a private firm and the Mexican Government for a supply of a certain amount of arms.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—The message of Count Yamamoto, Premier of Japan, to THE SUN confirms what has been stated in Washington regarding the sale of Japanese arms in Mexico.

President Wilson has said that he had been informed that the matter was purely a business arrangement between a Japanese firm dealing in arms and ammunition and the Government of Mexico.

Only Count Yamamoto's statement that no delivery has yet been made under the contract between the Huerta Government and the Japanese firm differs from what has been officially announced here.

It was said at the White House that the Government understood that one delivery had been made and that a second was intended to be made in February.

HUERTA ORDERS ARRESTS.

Many Prominent Men Imprisoned and Much Unrest Prevails.

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 31.—The secret police of the Huerta Government found a large quantity of arms and ammunition today in the yards of the Central Railway in the capital. It is believed that this stock of munitions was intended for the plotters who had arranged to assassinate President Huerta on February 9, the anniversary of the citizenship affair, which swept Madero from power.

Many wealthy Mexicans who are suspected of having been implicated in this plot were arrested today. They include Jose Reguena, at one time the head of the Felix Diaz party; Capt. Serrano of the Engineer Corps stationed in Chaplain, a suburb of Mexico city, and a priest. In the homes of these men were found large sums in silver half pesos, which were presumably stored there for the purpose of paying off the rebel troops.

Believe Many at Large.

It is believed here that the Government agents have succeeded in capturing only the intellectual chiefs of the movement and that the active conspirators who are much more dangerous to the Government are still at large.

A feeling of great unrest prevails throughout the city and detachments of troops have been scouring the streets of the capital for the last twenty-four hours, thus showing the Government's apprehension of an armed uprising. The belief that a sudden catastrophe is likely to put an end to the Huerta Administration is widespread. It is believed also that many of the alleged conspirators who have been arrested have been shot.

Charge Speculation in Money. Secretary of the Interior Alcocer says the Government has information that powerful companies have been formed for the purpose of speculating in American money. It is impossible otherwise to account for the shortage not only of silver but of bank notes.

JUST EAT SEA MUSSELS.

That's the Way to Reduce Cost of Living, Says Dr. Field.

Worcester, Mass., Jan. 31.—That the Federal Government has found a way to reduce the high cost of living is the statement of Dr. Irving A. Field of Clark University, who has just returned home after six years of scientific investigation for the Government into the value of sea foods not generally used.

According to Dr. Field the sea mussel is the solution so long sought. "The movement to place sea mussels on the market is no visionary scheme of lovers of unusual experiment," said Prof. Field. "The sea mussel movement is part of a practical attempt of the national Government to attack the high cost of living by introducing cheap substantial and hitherto unused foodstuffs into America."

When the public becomes aware of the fact that from 6,000 to 8,000 bushels of mussels grow in one acre and that 25 cents worth will supply enough food for ten persons, Dr. Field declared, this despised dish will be welcomed as a great reducer of the cost of living in every home.

SEX HYGIENE TOPIC BARRED.

Montclair School Teachers Can't Even Discuss Subject.

MONTCLAIR, N. J., Jan. 31.—Montclair school authorities have issued orders prohibiting the teaching of sex hygiene in the public schools. Any teacher who violates the rule is liable to dismissal. Not only are the teachers and principals forbidden to discuss this subject, but they are forbidden to "lend or offer to lend to pupils books on the subject."

DIAMOND MEN'S TRUNKS GO TO CUSTOM HOUSE

Authorities Refuse to Talk After Questioning Their Owners.

Benjamin de Jong and R. Van Dam, connected with diamond dealing firms by this city, who were cabin passengers by the French liner France, in yesterday from Havre, were escorted to the Custom House by inspectors who thought they had found in the trunks of the voyagers importations needing explanation.

De Jong, said his business address was 12 John street and Van Dam said he was in business at 427 Fifth avenue, the number of the store occupied by Edward Van Dam, diamond merchant and cutter. Van Dam had two trunks and De Jong had one trunk and a satchel. These were taken to the Custom House with the owners and the latter were under inquiry for several hours before Gen. Nelson H. Henry, Surveyor of the Port, and Special Deputy Surveyor George J. Smyth, the inspectors and deputy surveyor in charge of the examination of the France's passengers were also present. It was said that the examination related to the importation of gems of considerable value.

At the end of the hearing in the Custom House Surveyor Henry said he could not make public anything about the case. De Jong and Van Dam said they had nothing to do with the investigation; that everything, so far as he was concerned, was all right.

All the surveyor's staff who were asked concerning the case declined to talk about it.

HEAVY STORM DAMAGE IN OHIO.

Passenger Boat Torn From Moorings and Tossed About.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Jan. 31.—Ohio was swept by a blizzard today. From Lake Erie to the Ohio River the storm caused thousands of dollars worth of damage. Rafts driven by winds which attained a velocity of from fifty to sixty miles an hour were changed to a winter blizzard of snow and sleet, leaving a trail of broken rafts and almost prostrated telegraph facilities.

At Marietta the steamer Rainbow, with sixty passengers on board, was blown from her moorings and tossed helplessly in the Ohio River for more than an hour during which the passengers were in a state of panic. The steamer finally lodged against the northern bank of the river undamaged.

Heavy snow storms that fell widely, caused traffic and did considerable damage are reported from many sections of Indiana and Illinois.

INNOCENT; HE HANGS HIMSELF.

Washington Man Prefers Death to Jail on False Charge.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—Because he was locked up by the police on the charge of having stolen twelve parcel post stamps, which he was found trying to sell, Joseph Gregory, 42 years old, hanged himself in a police station to-night. When arrested Gregory said the stamps were given to him by his sister. Investigation showed that the stamps were found on his body contained the statement that rather than be sent to jail for something of which he was not guilty he preferred to die.

SOUTH CLEVELAND IS GAS MAD.

Big Well "Drilled In" by J. L. Stadler, Excites Land Owners.

CLEVELAND, Jan. 31.—The whole south side of Cleveland became "gas mad" today following the discovery of a remarkable gas well on land occupied by the plant of the J. L. and H. Stadler Refining and Fertilizer Company, Denison avenue. John L. Stadler, head of the fertilizer company and owner of the big gas well, became in effect a millionaire in a night. Speculators scoured the Cuyahoga River Valley for miles after options on property, or lease on gas or oil rights, but property values thereabouts jumped almost to the first roar of the big gas well, with no options or leases were in the market. Mr. Stadler said that the East Ohio Gas Company had made him an offer of approximately \$2,000,000 for the well and his gas rights on the land surrounding it. He refused the offer, and will be signing two additional wells at once.

Mayor Mitchell, aroused by adverse criticism at the City Club yesterday afternoon, declared emphatically that it would be a mighty good thing for New York city to obtain enough home rule to enable its citizens to decide whether or not they want the laws against gambling and the social evil, as well as the excise laws, enforced.

Furthermore he believed that the Mayor in his policies should be responsible to the citizens who put him in office and they should have the power to recall him if they saw fit. In the meantime he as Mayor in present circumstances will use every endeavor to drive "the system" out of the Police Department with the five new bills sent to the Legislature and also bring Col. Goethals as Police Commissioner. He has promised to come if President Wilson will retire him when constructive work on the Panama Canal is finished and after the Commissioner gets real power over the force by the measures proposed.

FATHER DEBOLD BLACKJACKED.

Footpad Ran Away When He Saw Victim Was a Priest.

A man with a blackjack attacked the Rev. Frank Debold, acting pastor of the Holy Family Roman Catholic Church, Thirtieth street near Fourth avenue, South Brooklyn, while Father Debold was returning from a sick call at 11 o'clock on Thursday night. The thug ran away when he saw that his victim was a priest. Father Debold went home with a bad bruise on his head and was in bed until last night under the care of Dr. J. G. Ditmars of 510 Ninth street. He expects to celebrate mass in his church this morning. The assault was not reported to the police.

PARIS TO GREET ROYALTY.

Kings of England, Denmark and Spain Soon to Visit Capital.

PARIS, Jan. 31.—Paris is preparing to receive royalty in proper form and President Poincare is already filling his rooms with decorations and toys. King George and Queen Mary of England will arrive here on April 29. The King of Denmark will come on May 19 and King Alfonso will make several brief calls between March and July. President Poincare will go to St. Petersburg on July 15.

DR. ANNA SHAW TAXED ON \$30,000

Surgeon Leader's Personality Assessed at That Figure.

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 31.—Dr. Anna Howard Shaw, president of the American Women's Suffrage Association, who recently refused to fill out assessment blanks sent to her by the tax assessor of upper Providence township, Delaware county, was amazed to learn today that she will probably be required to pay taxes on personal property appraised at \$30,000. A High Branch, the assessor, fixed the value of her personal holdings, and the County Commissioners turned a deaf ear to the pleas of Miss Lucy B. Anthony, private secretary to Dr. Shaw, when Miss Anthony tried to have the amount cut down. The Commissioners said the only way Dr. Shaw can have the assessment reduced is to fill out the blanks that were sent to her. Miss Anthony said she would try to induce Dr. Shaw to comply with the requirements.

NEW HEAD FOR JOHNS HOPKINS.

Report Names Dr. George A. Goodenough as Next President.

BALTIMORE, Jan. 31.—George Alfred Goodenough, at present professor of thermodynamics in the University of Illinois, will be the next president of the Johns Hopkins University, according to a report that reached Baltimore this afternoon. Officials at Hopkins would not announce the selection of Dr. Goodenough, but it was not denied that his name was under consideration. Dr. Goodenough is now in China, where he is interested in scientific work, and it is said that arrangements for his coming to Baltimore would naturally take some time, as he had contemplated making a prolonged stay in the Far East.
