

MANY RETURN MONEY TO BANK FOR SAVINGS

Scare Appears to Be Over and Senseless Run Is on the Wane.

ONLY ABOUT 600 IN LINE

Men Put Back Savings Drawn Out by Scared Wives Earlier in Day.

The rumor monger who started the senseless run on the Bank for Savings, Twenty-second street and Fourth avenue, on Tuesday last will not be sought by the bank officials, for the run is on the wane, and many of those who drew out their savings in the first excited hours returned the money yesterday.

with the 1,500 who called Friday and the 1,500 the day before. Long before the opening hours, however, there were twenty-five women hugging the vestibule waiting to be admitted. When the doors were opened there were probably 1 1/2 in line, whereas the day before the interior of the bank was not only crowded but the lines extended around two sides of the building.

But many of those who stood in line yesterday came to have the interest computed on their accounts; others came just to look on, and many had money in their hands to deposit and were flaunting it in the eyes of those who doubted the bank's safety.

Late the night before just as the bank was closing two laborers pushed their way in and stood at the receiving teller's window. They were dressed in working clothes. A man who had just withdrawn his account walked up to them and advised them that they were at the wrong window. They gave him a subtle hint and each deposited more than \$500 that their wives had withdrawn the same day.

the Bank for Savings. He did. Three women who took out \$1,075 on Wednesday redeposited it after the example set by the preacher. The largest single deposit of the day was \$1,500. Altogether \$12,000 was deposited in reopened accounts and \$5,500 in new accounts, which makes a total of \$17,500, as against the \$15,000 of the day before. During the five days of the run \$107,500 has been deposited, which proves, say the bank officials, that the run is wholly unprovoked.

There have been no accurate statements of the amount of money withdrawn as yet, but these figures were agreed upon yesterday as being as correct as could be gathered. On Tuesday \$187,000 was drawn. On Wednesday, \$354,000; Thursday, \$300,000; Friday, \$280,000 and yesterday, \$200,000. These figures total \$2,481,000, or a little over 2 per cent. of the \$97,159,688.67 which the bank has on hand and in securities.

500 SEE \$8,000,000 POWER PLANT OPEN

Cortelyou Starts New Manhattan Station of United Electric Company.

IS PLANNED FOR FUTURE

Building Big Enough to Meet Demands of Growing Northern Section.

The \$8,000,000 power station of the United Electric Light and Power Company, between the Harlem River and Sherman Creek at 201st street, near the Dyckman street Broadway subway station, was formally put in operation at 1 P. M. yesterday. George B. Cortelyou, president of the Consolidated Gas Company, turned a valve which let steam into the big turbines. Five hundred guests of

the company journeyed up to 201st street in the rain to watch him do it. This operation took the load of lighting a large share of Manhattan and the Bronx from the water-side stations of the New York Edison Company and transferred it to the new building. After seeing the machinery put in motion the visitors toured the plant with guides who explained the mysteries of big plants. It took an hour and a half to make a hurried trip through the building.

Had Lunch on Top Floor. The structure's exterior is of red brick, with an artificial granite base and terra cotta trimming, and a tile roof. It contains 15,000 tons of steel and is set in the mud on 6,000 piles. A section tunnel, ten feet in diameter, takes water from the Harlem River and dumps it into Sherman Creek after it is used in the pumps and turbines. The building contains seven floors and basement.

The visitors had lunch on the top floor in what will eventually be the offices. There they were welcomed by President Cortelyou. "The splendid new station is the most modern and one of the largest of its kind in the world," he said. "It has long been apparent that the press of population in Manhattan is exerted steadily northward, and one of the problems of public utility companies in this city has been to provide facilities adequate to the demands created by this movement. It is not merely enough to keep pace with the demand—it is necessary to keep ahead of it. This real estate was purchased in 1905.

The building was begun in July, 1912. It has been designed with a view to allowing for substantial additions to its equipment. Among the guests were Nicholas F. Brady, president of the New York Edison Company; Frank W. Smith, vice-president and general manager of the United Electric Light and Power Company; James A. Farrell, president of the United States Steel Corporation; W. R. Adcock, vice-president of the Consolidated Gas Company; John W. Lieb, Jr., vice-president and general manager of the New York Edison Company; Commissioner Henry S. Thompson of the water supply department; Edwin W. Rice, president of the General Electric Company; and Edward E. McCall, chairman of the Public Service Commission.

FOOD EXPORTS INCREASE.

Gain of \$15,079,000 in 1913 Despite Big Drop in Beef Shipments.

The total exports of meat and dairy products in 1913, as shown by Government reports, amounted to \$138,924,052, or an increase of \$15,679,960 over the figures for 1912. There was a great decrease in the beef exports. In 1912 only 7,161 head of cattle, valued at \$33,988, were exported, as against 32,643 head, valued at \$3,042,523 in 1913. During the year 6,818,142 pounds of fresh beef, valued at \$7,627,270, were exported, as against 8,821,812 pounds, valued at \$1,027,487 the preceding year.

BLAMES BLASTS FOR BAD PEN.

Aged Astrologer Accused of Sending Scurrilous Letters About Subway.

"A person in the nervous state that I am from the continual blasting in the subway excavation at my very door is likely to do something desperate without being conscious of the fact." Thus the Rev. Mr. Altan Z. Stevenson, president of the Astrological Society for the Dissemination of the Philosophy of Stellar Vibrations, conceded when arraigned before United States Commissioner Shields yesterday that he might possibly be the subconscious author of certain scurrilous letters written to Mayor Mitchell, Edward E. McCall, chairman of the Public Service Commission; Health Commissioner Goldwater and Police Commissioner McKay.

The letters charged these officials with negligence in allowing the blasting in the new subway to wreck the health and the homes of the people along the line. Some of the letters were couched in indecent language, according to Assistant United States Attorney Stanton.

Mr. Stevenson was held by Commissioner Shields in \$100 bail for a hearing. He is more than 70 years old. He says his home, at 1829 Lexington avenue, is full of broken windows, broken water-pipes and shattered nerves as a result of the dynamite explosions in the subway excavation.
