Great Sprint by Boston Gives Victory to B. A. A. Relay Over N. Y. A. C.

ELLER TAKES LOW HURDLE Freshman Teams of Columbia and Fordham Win Class Race Relays.

The mainly to the efforts of Tom Halpin the Boston A. A. relay team won the one mile interest race from the New York A. C. last night at the annual indoor games of Fordham University in the twenty-first Regiment Armory.

The Irish American A. C. team was entered failed to materialize, and when the start was called only William Meanix for Boston and O. W. De Gruchy faced the barrier. Meanix had the better of the start, but the New York man overhauled him and led for the quarter in 53 1-5 seconds by about four yards.

In the next relay H. P. Mahoney took up the baton for Boston and Drew Valentine for New York. Valentine was not as speedy as his rival and the Winged Foot crowd had their lead cut down to a yard. The time for the second quarter was 53 seconds.

Harry J. Smith of the Bronx Church House won the two mile handicap from scratch in 2:32 1-2. Although he showed handicaps up to 175 yards, he was a half lap ahead at the finish.

J. J. Eller of the Irish American A. C. added one more to his long string of hurdle race victories by winning the 60 yard event from scratch over five 2 feet 6 inch jumps in 7 3-5 seconds.

The Ellers did not win more easily than the hurdle race. In the relay race, the team of eight feet and partly because the race was run under conditions with which the winner was unfamiliar.

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Sprinting Quartet Beats Four of B. A. A.—Does 1,560 Yards in 3 Minutes 3 Seconds.

Boston, Feb. 28.—As anticipated, Phillips Exeter Academy won the twenty-fourth annual indoor championship track and field meet of the Intercollegiate Athletic Association at Mechanics Hall this afternoon, scoring 25 1/2 points to 17 for Worcester Academy, which finished second.

Interest in the performances of the schoolboys was overshadowed by the fact that the Harvard relay team, which had not been expected to run, won the 1,560 yard sprinting quartet with a record of 3 minutes and 3 seconds.

The meet was the third meeting between the two relay teams this season. Harvard won the previous two, in each of which an opponent fell, but to-day's race was won on its merits.
