

SEIGEL DEPOSITORS TO GET CASH AT ONCE

Receiver's Attorney Agrees, if Judge Consents, to Immediate Dividend.

AUCTION BRINGS \$268,112 Fourteenth Street Store Sells for \$70,000 More Than Best Previous Bid.

The fear that the 15,000 depositors in the Henry Siegel bank would have to wait several months before getting any part of the \$225,000 settled on them by the reorganization company because of an effort on the part of a few lawyers to hold the payment until Siegel and Vogel were adjudged bankrupts was dispelled yesterday.

Divorce Action Not Feared. It was the opinion of Mr. Proskauer that the divorce action started by Mrs. Siegel would not have the slightest effect on the depositors' or other creditors' claims against Siegel as an individual.
