Anarchist Insists She Has Been on Hunger Strike Throughout Incarceration.

Reba Edelsohn, the anarchist, was released from the workhouse on Blackwell's Island yesterday. A bond of \$200 was given by a surety company as a guarantee that she would keep the peace for three months.

After leaving the island Miss Edelsohn went to the office of an anarchistic publication and wrote out a long statement denouncing the administration of Correction Commissioner Katharine B. Davis and the sanitary conditions in the prison.

She stated that she had seen in this vein for a considerable length. She said she would remain on a liquid diet for a few days. To-day she expects to go to the mountains to recover from her hunger strike.
