ATTACKS DERNBURG'S APOLOGY FOR KAISER

To the Editor of THE SUN:—Sir: The very clever apology for the Kaiser and Germany by Dr. Dernburg, published in your issue of September 22nd, is a masterpiece of misdirection. It is a masterpiece of misdirection because it is so cleverly constructed that it is impossible to see the real situation in Germany.

The German Bundestag is given a somewhat similar function, but as the Kaiser is not a monarch, the Bundestag is not a parliament. It is a council of the empire, and its members are appointed by the Kaiser.

Prussia is entitled to seventeen votes, and the additional number required for a majority can be obtained from the many small States that are easily swayed by the dictates and the will of the King of Prussia, whose influence is paramount in the Bundestag.

The next effort is to show that the Reichstag is chosen under a ballot law more liberal than the one that provides for the election of the President of the United States. It is true that Bismarck had to grant universal suffrage for the election of the Reichstag, but it is to be noted that the Reichstag is not a parliament.

This analysis shows conclusively that the system outlined cannot be compared to our American system for several reasons. In the first place, Germany is not governed by the people, but by a chamber representing dynasties and by the will of the autocratic Emperor.

After this Dr. Dernburg continues with the endeavor "to prove that this war is not a Kaiser's war, because he cannot make a war, but the German people."

It is a really gross mistake, however, to assume that the whole German people were unanimous for war. What actually occurred was this: After the Emperor had been brought to the brink of hostilities, or war had been actually declared by the Emperor, about which he was not required by the constitution to consult the elective chamber, then the Reichstag, when asked to vote the war credits, granted them unanimously.

To the Editor of THE SUN:—Sir: If women in Europe could vote would the present widespread war have taken place? This is a question often asked, and by the more radical suffragists it is answered in the negative. This view should be somewhat modified. There is almost universal male suffrage in Europe, and in none of them do the voters have any voice in declaring war, and in only two, France and Great Britain, do they rest with the elective Parliaments to go into or stay out of a war.

Women, therefore, even though endowed with the force of the ballot, would have been powerless to avert the present war. In France it is a fight for life, and in England it would have been eventually if she had not gone to the relief of France and Belgium. How then could women have dared to prevent it even had they possessed the power? It is impossible to show that the present war would not have taken place had they been voters.

There can be little doubt, however, that where legislative bodies have the power to initiate war women would have a tremendous influence. In the United States, for instance, if they were a part of the constituency which elects the legislators, there are now no questions at issue beyond the question of whether they should be settled by courts of arbitration, but a public sentiment is usually necessary to force the adoption of this method.

Consider for instance the two conspicuous instances in our own country, the Spanish American war and the present situation in Mexico.
