
Great crater formed by explosion of German howitzer shell. Columns of greasy black smoke are sent up.

GERMANS ADVANCING IN MASSED FORMATION.

The heavy losses of the Germans have been due in part to their way of charging the enemy in masses. "We couldn't help hitting them," a British soldier wrote home. "We saw them first about 800 yards away, and they came in bunches, just like a crowd leaving a football match. For every one that fell on our side they lost ten or twelve. It was 'rapid firing' and we gave it to them hot."
