

FIVE MORE INFECTED DAIRY HERDS FOUND

Milk Supply From Fourteen Farms Near New York Now Cut Off.

2,000 COWS IN DANGER

Cases of foot and mouth disease in four more herds, two in the infected dairy farm colony at Woodhaven and two far distant from the Louis Wank farm at New Lots. Were found yesterday.

Many Farms Quarantined.

A herd of eighty-one milk cows, owned by Louis Dietrich, a dairyman on the Patterson Plank Road, Secaucus, Hudson county, New Jersey, was put in official list yesterday as being infected with the foot and mouth disease.

There are now six farms on which there are 475 cattle under quarantine in Secaucus. The disease is in eight herds on Long Island—five in Woodhaven and three in New Lots.

Dr. Albert Long, in charge of the Brooklyn office of the federal bureau of animal industry, and Dr. H. D. Gill, veterinarian for the State Department of Agriculture, were in conference for several hours yesterday.

Because of the rapidity with which the infection spreads and the many agencies which may carry the germs, the Federal and State inspectors are taking every precaution to prevent the disease from being communicated from herd to herd.

Pigeons to Be Shot.

Pigeons that cannot be cooped up will be shot, and even the crows will become a target for the official sharpshooters, as it is possible for a crow, alighting on the ground where diseased cattle have stood, to carry the germs to a barnyard or field where healthy animals.

During the last epidemic of the foot and mouth disease a flock of chickens in Buffalo were washed in a solution of carbolic acid. Later the chickens were killed and sent to market.

It is probable that the work of killing the infected Long Island herds will be commenced to-morrow.

THENTON, N. J., Nov. 21.—Fearing a wide epidemic of the foot and mouth disease among cattle, Secretary of Agriculture Houston to-day asked Gov. Fielder for cooperation in stamping out the epidemic.

At Secaucus, where six herds were found to be affected, at the request of Federal and State authorities the State Board of Health assigned three additional inspectors to that place.

UNEMPLOYED RUSH KEEPS UP.

Sullivan and His Wife Have \$400,000 in Banks

Convicted President of Union Bank Has Made Large Deposits Since Bankruptcy, and Even Since His Incarceration in Sing Sing.

TWO ACCOUNTS IN MANHATTAN AND FLATBUSH

That David A. Sullivan, convicted president of the bankrupt Union Bank, and his wife, Mrs. Anna P. Sullivan, have deposited more than \$400,000 in two trust companies since the first closing of the Brooklyn institution in January, 1908, was learned last night.

According to the records of the Empire Trust Company of Manhattan, Sullivan, under the account of "David A. Sullivan, Attorney," made deposits with that concern aggregating \$244,000 from October 16, 1905, to November 8, 1912.

RAILROADS TO CUT OFF MANY THROUGH TRAINS

That Is Report From Pittsburgh—Fewer Passengers Given as Reason.

PITTSBURG, Nov. 21.—It is reported in railroad circles that the presidents of the principal roads throughout the country have united in an agreement to eliminate a large number of through trains east and west from Chicago and that reductions in local train services throughout the United States will be made.

The only trains mentioned specifically at present are the Denver and Chicago limited of the Burlington.

Decrease in passenger traffic is said to have caused the railroad officials to reduce the number of trains.

It is said each of the seven "transcontinental" lines eliminates two through trains. Also it is reported there will be a reduction between Chicago and St. Louis and that several trains between Chicago and St. Paul and Minneapolis also will be taken off.

Roads operating east from Chicago will eliminate one or more trains each between that city and New York, according to the plans reported.

Passenger traffic officials of the Pennsylvania to-day said they had not been informed whether the proposed elimination of trains between Chicago and New York included any on that system.

BEWITCHING FIGURES IN THREE COURT CASES

Hypnotism to Fight Hypnotism Advised—Two Husbands Tell Strange Tales.

Three court cases in which hypnotism or bewitching were charged figured in the news yesterday.

A remarkable letter filed in the Supreme Court in connection with a suit by Mrs. Hester A. Laffin Jones for a divorce from Gardner Jones, a Christian Scientist, discloses a plan of her relatives to combat with hypnotism what they called her husband's hypnotic influence over her.

The letter was written by Mrs. Jones's sister-in-law, Mrs. Louis E. Laffin, to Mrs. Jones's attorney, David Wallace, from her home at Lake Forest, Ill. She said:

"I wish we could find some place where Mattie (Mrs. Jones) could be with people that she cares for and protected from that man's clutches. The dear girl is so beautiful and she cannot any more help dressing in exquisite taste than she can help breathing, and it is just as unconsciously done, I fear for her appearance in court with that unspookable person, Dr. Cary, who might hypnotize her there, and then the undoubted evidence of it might help the case and those fighting for her freedom, but he feels strongly as I do that hypnotizing influence. My sister suggested fighting hypnotism with hypnotism and engaging Dr. Quackenbos in New York to hypnotize Mattie."

The case was before the referee on an application by Mrs. Jones's attorney to have his counsel fees fixed. The testimony does not indicate that the plans discussed in the letter were carried out.
