DENIES PRESIDENT GAVE PLEDGE TO SUFFRAGISTS

White House Refutes Statement of Dr. Anna Shaw After Delegation's Call.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14.—White House officials took pains this morning to make it clear that President Wilson had said nothing to a delegation of suffragettes earlier in the day which could possibly be construed as a commitment of himself to the equal franchise legislation which soon is to be voted upon in the New Jersey Legislature.

The delegation, which was headed by Dr. Anna Howard Shaw, urged the President to issue a statement favoring suffrage in his own State. After the interview Dr. Shaw said that the women had left the White House with the distinct impression that the President would issue such a statement soon.

Organization Formed to See That Only Prohibitionist Is Next President.

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JAPAN DRINKS LESS LIQUOR.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14.—The Department of Commerce made public to-day a report received from Consul West at Kobe in which he says there is a decreasing use of liquor in Japan. The report says in part: "In spite of patriotic resolutions to drink nothing but sake at public dinners, neither either tipple are ousting the national beverage from public favor or a wave of temperance is passing over the land. At Osaka, a brewing centre near Nagoya, sales have been so slow of late that brewers are selling off cheap to clear their godowns for the new season's brew. The slackness which in October last was estimated to cause a decrease of 10 per cent. in this year's brew has since then become so pronounced that a falling off of 20 per cent. is now expected."
